Market Ends Good Week

Closing Session Is Apathetic; Trade Only 433,380

NEW YORK, May 22,-(AP)-Mild irregularity in Saturday's short session followed a generally successful week for the stock market. A large batch of pleasing dividends provided a prop for some shares throughout the week.

Saturday's proceedings were notably apathetic, turnover of 433,380 shares being the lowest since Jan. 23. It compared with 640,210 last Saturday. On Monday dealings fell below the million-or-better mark in a full session for the first time since April 28. During the six days there were only two sessions that ex-

ceeded a million shares. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks ended down .1 of a point at 50.7 but on the week was up .6.
