Fresh vegetable salad will begin the meal that includes also, fresh asparagus. Raw vegetable salad Broiled macaroni and cheese Creamed asparagus Cottage pudding Lemon sauce

BROILED MACARONI AND CHEESE
12 ounces macaroni
2 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon onion, finely chopped
2 pieces celery, finely chopped
1/2 cup flour
3 cups milk
1 teaspoon salt
Dash pepper
3/4 teaspoon prepared mustard
6 ounces American cheese, grated

Cook macaroni in 3 quarts boiling, salted water for 15 to 20 minutes, or until tender. Drain thoroughly and pour into a casserole. Simmer onion and celery in melted butter for 5 minutes. Blend in flour; add milk, salt and pepper, and cook until the sauce boils and thickens, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, add mustard and cheese; stir until blended. Pour the hot cheese sauce over the hot macaroni and place under the broiler to brown. Serves 6.
