Baker Rites Set Today; Was Pioneer

Clarence Edward Baker, 67, died Monday, May 24, at the home of his son, Charles V. Baker, 2690 Brooks street, Salem.

Born in Wisconsin in 1855, he was the son of Varranus and Sally Fimmel Baker. His father died in 1859 and the widowed mother brought her three children across the plains in 1865, settling in Yamhill county. His two sisters, Mrs. Emma Galloway of Salem and Mrs. Addie Hendrix of Carlton, died several years ago.

Mr. Baker married Nancy Elmina Ferguson of a prominent pioneer family of Yamhill county in 1881. She died in 1911. Three children were born of this union, of whom the son only survives.

The deceased spent all the active years of his long life in farming operations in Yamhill county. The survivors of his immediate family are the son, nine grandchildren and ten great grandchildren. Two of his four grandsons are serving in the United States navy.

Services will be held at the Macy Funeral parlor in McMinnville, Wednesday afternoon, May 26, with burial in the Evergreen cemetery.

Junior Marine Corps Buys Bonds, Stamps

One hundred percent American and almost 100 percent in war bonds is the record of the junior marines, members of the corps discovered when comparing notes during the last drill. They have purchased a total of \$1375 in bonds and \$258.70 in stamps.

J. Edgar Reay, district manager of the Maccabees, received word from the home office that

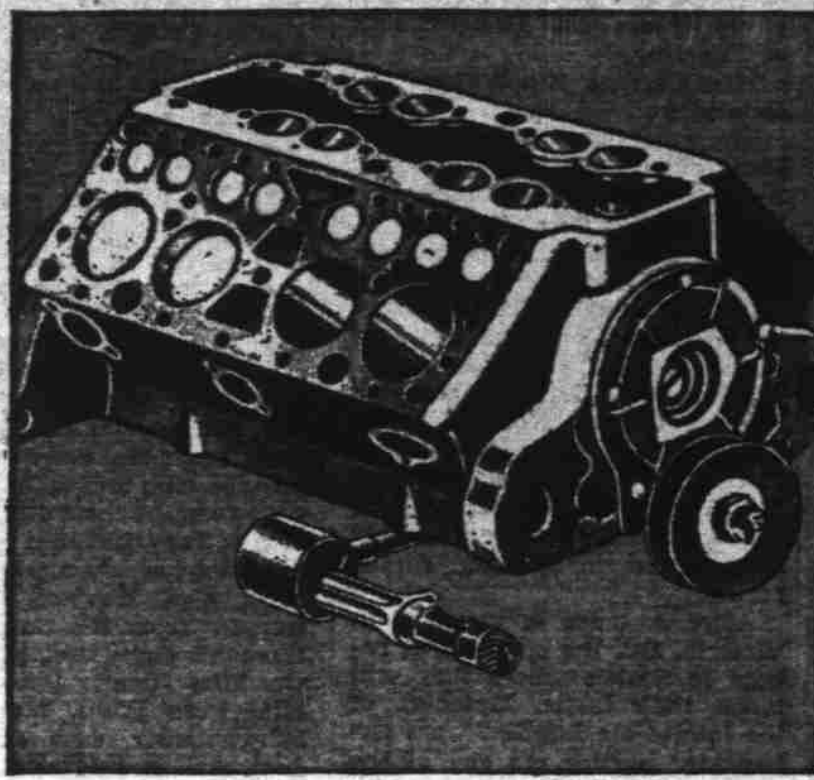
he led the United States and Canada in writing sick and accident insurance for April. Reay has represented the Maccabees in this part of the state for several years and has always stood near the top, he said.
