Many Stocks Reach Peaks

Buyers Favor Blue Chips; Some Profit Taking at Finish

NEW YORK, May 27-(AP)-Stock market buyers favored blue chips in Thursday's proceedings and, despite relatively heavy profit taking in the final hour, many issues touched peaks for three years or longer.

Prices in most cases were best in the morning. Gains of 1 to 3 points were widespread. Customers then began to trim accounts in preparation for the extra-long weekend - principal exchanges will recess Monday for memorial day-and top quotations generally were reduced or converted into small minus signs at the close.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up .1 of a point at 51.6. highest level since January 5, 1940. It was the third successive recovery. The market was fairly broad, 966 issues being traded. Of these 497 were up, 244 down and 225 unchanged. Transfers totaled 1,468,440 shares against 1,321,870 yesterday.

Stocks in the "new high" division included Santa Fe, which slipped with the rest of the rails at the last and ended unchanged American Telephone, Westinghouse, Dow Chemical, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, United Aircraft, Union Carbide, and Johns Manville. Northern Pacific and Shesapeake and Ohio retained advances, along with Bethelehem, Western Union, Anaconda and Radio Corp.

Minor declines were suffered by US Steel, General Motors, International Harvester, American Broccolt, case Green onions, doz, bun. Smelting and Sperry.

By Quinn Hall Rye Market Takes Slump

CHICAGO, May 27-(A)-The rye market ran into a technical reaction Thursday, which grain men considered natural after the advance of the past four sessions, and prices slumped major frac-tions. Late selling in rye spread to wheat and oats, both of which closed on minor losses. Although the rye pit was again the cefiter of attention, and about twice as many brokers were represented there as in the wheat pit, activity was on a considerably smaller scale than in previous days of the week. Turnover in rye this week has been the heaviest in history. At the close rye was off 36-34, July 93 %-1/2; wheat was down 1/4-1/2, July \$1.44 1/4-1/4; Septem-




