

Oregon State 'War Bonds' Uncovered

Deputy State Treasurer Fred Paulus, while rummaging through a vault in the state treasury department here Thursday, found

\$15,000 of unpaid bonds issued by the state under date of April 1, 1881, to cover claims incurred in the Modoc-Indian war.

The claims were approved by the Oregon legislature in 1876 and were in \$500 and \$1000 denominations and were termed "war bonds." They drew interest at the rate of 7 per cent and were payable on January 1, 1890.

Broadcast Is Set, Service Men Saturday

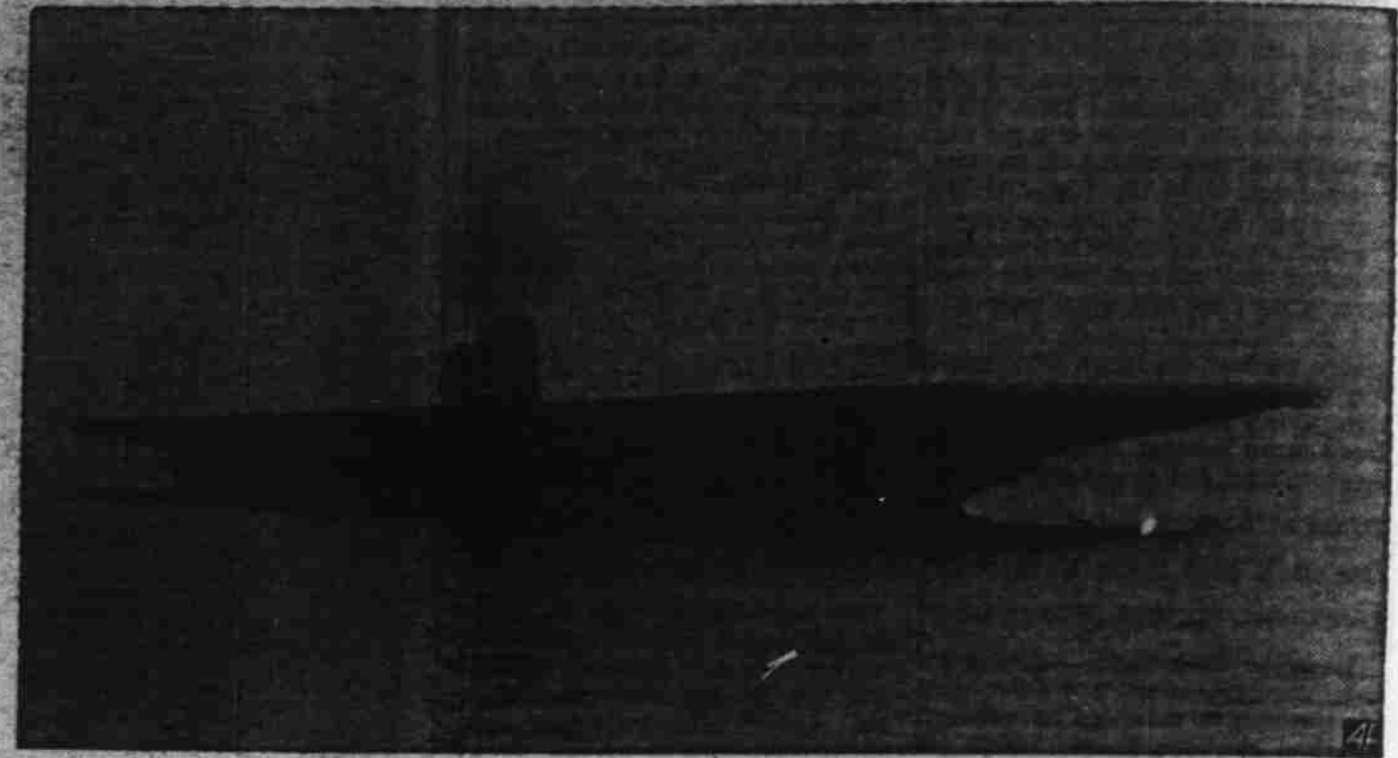

April Arrests Net \$12,900

State police operatives made 1356 arrests for traffic law violations, with fines of \$11,497.15, during April, Charles F. Fray, superintendent of state police, reported to Governor Earl Snell Thursday.

Thirty-four arrests were for driving while intoxicated while 28 resulted from reckless driving.

Arrests in the general law enforcement division numbered 362 with fines of \$3774.10. There were 37 acquittals.

There were 110 arrests in the game code division and two arrests in the commercial fisheries code division. Fines in the game code division aggregated \$2296.60.
