Following upon the heels of the announcement of the lowering of the height requirement one inch, to four feet 11 inches, Chief Fallon learned that vision requirements are less stringent also. Until the new order, women must read the chart 12 feet away without glasses but now women will be accepted with vision corrected to 20/20 with glasses and with no other vision requirements.

## Court Awards WU \$19,000 From Estate

The case of Willamette university vs. Harriet Durkimer estate closed Friday after jurors had returned a verdict for the plaintiff allowing the university to recover \$19,000 and interest dating from 1922 from the estate.

Heirs of the estate alleged that all conditions of the gift were not followed and had therefore not paid the remaining \$19,000 of the gift allowed the university previously by the probate court.

Conditions of the gift were that Willamette university should have in endowment subscriptions \$1,250,000 on or before 1922 and that construction on a gymnasium was to have been begun before June 1 of that year. The matter was appealed to the circuit court from which the decision was handed.
