If You Like Flowers . . .

Roses predominate at the flower show being held this weekend in the showrooms of the Valley Motor company, although there are many other flowers of special interest included in the displays.

The show, free to the public, opened at noon Saturday and will continue today. Judging took place on Saturday.

The annual show is being sponsored by eleven garden club's of the district and Mrs. C. A. Kells, president of the Salem Garden club is general chairman.

Beside featuring flowers judged for their perfection, arrangements of various blooms are on display. A special red, white and blue arrangement is attracting attention and vegetable exhibits lend a utilitarian touch to the show.

Specimens of various flowers attract the expert gardener, and centerpieces for formal and informal dinners, as well as arrangements of several kinds, attract the casual flower lover.
