# Nazism Cause, **Knab Asserts**

Nazism did not originate with upposed abuses of the Versailles treaty but was an outgrowth of a militant Prussian military spirit which was popularized by Hit-ler's political religion of National Socialism, Otto Knab, German refugee and author, declared at the Friday luncheon meeting of the Salem Realty board in the Marion hotel. Following the last world war

German militarists signed a preliminary harsh peace with Russia which would have taken 40 million nationals out of the Soviet whereas the treaty of Versailles took less than six million German nationals from German borders and was a peace prayer book compared with German peace plans in the last war, Knab said. Knab attributed part of the success of Nazism to the propaganda methods which kept even historians ignorant and placed noncooperative German citizens in

In recommending a post war policy of the allies for a defeated Germany, Knab urged supervised reeducation for a disillusioned Nazi youth and said force should be used against a conquered Ger-many when an invisable supervision fails. Avoid weaving in and out between army vehicles. Be careful in any pessing movement while in the vicinity of army
