Boy Drowns At Stayton

Fishing Trip Ends Fatally for Tom Wechenky, 10

STAYTON—Fishing Thursday about 11 a. m. just below the Gardner headgates cost Tommy Wechenky his life when he fell in and was unable to swim. He was with a cousin, Quinten Domrowsky, who summoned Mrs. Addie Palmateer and Mrs. S. M. Kaufman, who happened to be near. They, in turn, called pickers from the Baysinger pea patch, some of whom reported that they saw the body float for 200 feet before disappearing.

Tommy Wechenky was ten years old, having been born on June 25, 1933. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leo Wechenky, a brother, Robert, two sisters, Catherine and Mary. The family came to Stayton from Wichita a little over a year ago.

The body was discovered by searchers in a rowboat at 3 p. m. and first aid immediately rendered by a crew working in re-lays. However, efforts were fruitless. The Salem First Aid car brought a pulmotor, but no signs of life could be found.

Oregon Unit Of Service Library Ends

The Oregon branch of the ninth service command library, conducted in the state library from early in 1942 until Thursday of this week, distributed 45,533 books among Oregon army centers, Miss Eleanor Stephens, state librarian, reported Friday to Gov. Earl Snell.

The library received 77,427 books for army distribution during 1942 and 16,237 during 1943. Oregon book donations totaled 40,977 in 1942 and 15,336 this year. The remaining books came from other states and CCC libraries.

The Portland air base received 616 books, the Salem air base, 200, the Salem fairgrounds, 150, Pendleton field 4157, Camp Adair 6, 102, Fort Stevens 2406 and Camp White 7510.

The Walla Walla, Wash., air base was assigned 2500 books and negro troops received 500.

Roberts New Red Cross Director

New Red Cross field director at Camp Adair is Leland Roberts, who comes from Santa Maria, Calif., to succeed Elwood H. Wiles. Since last August, Wiles has been field director for the Red Cross at Adair. He now goes to Marshfield to take over a new sub-office opening there, but will continue his itinerant service in five coastal counties which include military naval and coast guard units.

Roberts' work, in addition to that at Adair, will include several inland counties as well as the post as representative of the Red Cross at Corvallis, Eugene and Willamette university naval training units.
