

Profit Taking Hits Wheat

Oats Lower; Bread Cereal, Rye Show Miser Trend

CHICAGO, July 7.—(AP)—Profit-taking and hedge selling came into the wheat pit Wednesday and prices slumped fractionally despite the fact commercial interests were active buyers.

Oats were lower with wheat and rye showing a mixed trend. All contacts were at new seasonal highs in the first few minutes of trading, but deferred deliveries dropped sharply before the close.

May falling more than 2 cents. July, however, was strong and closed on a gain of a cent.

At the finish, wheat was 1/4-1/2 lower, July 1.48 1/2, oats were off 1/4-3/4, July 71 1/2-1/2; and rye was 2 1/2 lower to 1 cent higher, July \$1.13 1/4.

News that the senate had passed legislation to increase callings on corn from \$1.07 to \$1.40 a bushel, Chicago basis, came just at the close and too late to influence prices.

Inability to obtain corn has caused a market scramble by traders for substitute grains, traders said. Barley and oats are preferred.

Crop comments were mainly favorable, yields of winter wheat in Kansas and Nebraska running ahead of expectations.

There were no sales of corn reported in the cash market for the second consecutive day.

Senate Okehs \$1.40 Bushel Corn Price

WASHINGTON, July 7.—(AP)—Raising a new threat to President Roosevelt's "hold the line" order, the senate Wednesday stamped its approval on legislation raising the ceiling price on corn to \$1.40 a bushel from the present level of \$1.07 Chicago basis.

The farm bloc, firmly in the driver's seat, insisted that the increase is necessary to bring corn to the market where livestock feeders, poultry men and corn product manufacturers are clamoring for it. Under present conditions, they contended, corn growers can realize about \$1.37 a bushel by feeding it to hogs, and therefore refuse to sell for \$1.07 cash.

The bill now goes to the house where its fate is uncertain in view of efforts to start a summer recess this week. A possible indication of the White House attitude toward the measure was seen when Majority Leader Barkley said if congress started fixing prices on individual commodities, it was heading for "a hopeless swamp."

About the time that the senate passed the bill, Senator Byrd (D-Va.) made public a letter from Price Administrator Prentiss M. Brown attributing the shortage of commercial corn to increase demands, rather than price ceilings.

Declaring that hog production had increased in a year by 16,000,000 head, Brown said it might be necessary to use wheat and other small grains for feeding purposes and import Canadian barley and oats to supplement the domestic corn supply.

Lethargy Hits Stock Market

AP Average Down .1 At 52.1; War News Blamed for Slump

NEW YORK, July 7.—(AP)—A late burst of activity in airlines issues failed to shake the stock market out of its lethargy Wednesday, and, while many leading shares recovered a part of earlier losses, the close generally was at lower levels.

Prominent in the decline were steel and rail, trailed by pivotally retailing and chemical stocks, mostly off fractions.

Until the Airlines spurred, Utilities had offered the chief resistance and the Associated Press index for that group rose .1 of a point to a new high for 1943 at 35.8.

The day's drift apparently was a result of uncertainties regarding significance of the German advance in Russia, the eventual outcome of the anti-inflation and subsidy battle in Washington and a tendency to wait details of the Pacific battling. Turnover at 708,900 shares

compared with 662,185 Tuesday. Of 888 issues dealt in, 694 finished lower or unchanged. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined .1 of a point to 52.1. Bond price movements were irregular. Cotton futures closed 15 cents bale higher to 15 cents lower. Hog prices at Chicago were steady to a shade higher. Wheat in the midwestern market was off 1/4 to 1/2 cents a bushel.

To Check Scales

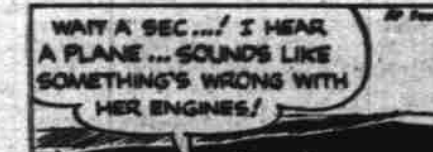
