CHICAGO, July 10 (AP)—Grains moved upward in moderate volume Saturday, encouraged by increased commercial activity in wheat, strength of the bread cereal at Winnipeg and reports the war food administration had informed congressmen that efforts would be made to get corn off farms, with a compromise ceiling of \$1.20 a bushel at Chicago a possibility.

Market List Is Hesitant

NEW YORK, July 10 (AP)—Good war news aided peace stocks in Saturday's market but the list as a whole, stepped out of a fairly steady week on a mildly hesitant note. While invasion of Sicily was cheering to Wall Street, it was suggested that, as a trend factor, this had been pretty well discounted. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged at 52.5, the highest level since November 4, 1939, reached yesterday. On the week the composite held a net advance of .2 of a point. Utilities again were supported and the average for this group edged up .1 to 36.1, best since November 13, 1940. Of 724 issues traded, 294 were up and 430 down or unchanged. Transfers totaled 478, 170 shares compared with 452,250, a week ago.

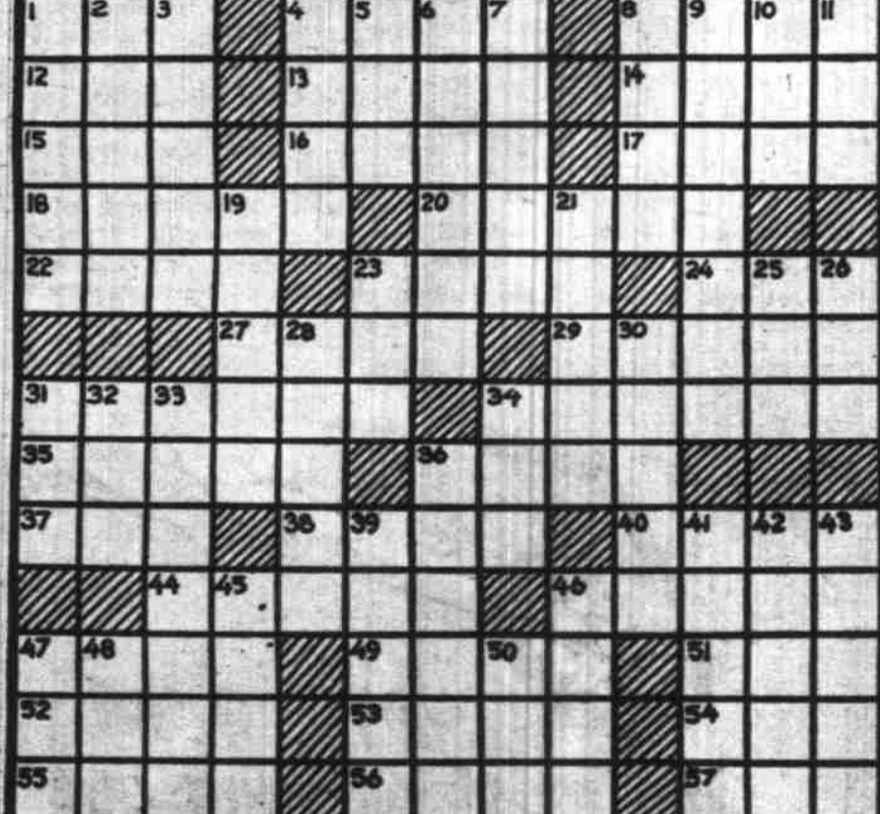
