C.—More than 7000 "government girls," who will form the population of Arlington Farms, an "all-girl city" now rising on the banks of the Potomac, will live in residence halls such as the one pictured above. It is one of ten, included in the \$7,500,000 project being constructed by the public buildings administration of the federal works agency on the banks of the Potomac. Safety and comfort are assured in the construction which includes the use of large panels, providing a complete wall, including exterior and interior finish and structural strength. They include insulation so that they keep out both cold and heat as Washington climate

No-Man's Land

Housing Project for Government Girls

Two hundred "government girls" have said a glad farewell to the discomfort of living four in a room meant for two, and have moved their possessions to the first unit of an "all-girl city" now rising on the banks of the Potomac just across from Washington, DC.

They are the first of some 7000 Washington war workers—all feminine—who will live in Arlington Farms, largest of six housing projects being constructed by the public buildings administration of the federal works agency, for the account of the federal public housing authority. The six projects will house an approximate 15,000 women.

Arlington Farms, located on what was the department of agriculture's experimental farm just across the Potomac from Washington and within walking distance of the Pentagon building and navy annex, provides real "comfort living" for thousands of girls who have come from every state in the union to Washington to do the paper work of the war—stenographers, clerks, typists, telephone operators. Heretofore, many of them have had to accept living conditions far below those to which they had been accustomed, because of the inevitable crowding of the capital of a nation at war.

Idaho Hall, now housing the first residents of Arlington Farms, and the nine other residence halls—each accommodates between 600 and 700 girls—is a spreading two-story structure of engineered timber construction.

The dormitory-like setup of these halls gives each girl privacy and companionship as well as attractive modern surroundings. After living in hall bedrooms, dark basement quarters and drafty attics, the girls welcomed the residence halls and moved immediately into Idaho Hall.

Since the 200 girls are workers at the Pentagon, not far from the project, they have more leisure time than when they were forced to travel by public transportation from all parts of the city.

Unlike the traditional dormitory, there is no curfew and the girls have complete freedom. The public rooms, however, close at 11 p. m. on week days and at midnight on Saturdays.



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knows those temperatures. All buildings will have engineered wood framing, the ceilings are of fibre board covered with fire-resistant paint, and all rooms are surrounded by fire stops built into the floors which are of double construction, finished off in solid oak. For further protection against weather extremes, roofs are heavily insulated, under their tar and gravel surfacing. Dormitories are being constructed in accordance with a system of construction of the John B. Pierce Foundation of New York City of which J. F. O'Brien is general manager and Robert L. Davison is director of housing research.

Ant Control Is Told

Ants that most frequently invade the house are either the small black ant, the tiny red ant or the "thief" ant, says Miss Frances Clinton, home demonstration agent. All are attracted by any kind of food.

Ants form colonies or nests so if the nests can be located and destroyed this is the most successful method of control. Inject carbon disulphide, kerosene or gasoline into the opening using an oil can or a small syringe. Since these are all inflammable materials, do not have fire round when using them.

If the colony cannot be located, the next best method is the use of poison baits. The food of ants may be divided into two classes. One group is strongly attracted to sweets and the other to greasy foods. To poison the sweet-eating species an effective bait can be made of a sugar syrup containing a small amount of arsenic. Ants feeding on this will carry the poison back to the young and the Queen in the colony.

For the grease-eating species, tartar emetic on strips of raw or cooked meat as bacon rinds is effective. Place these in cans fitted with tops that will allow the ants to enter, but are not

easily reached by children or pets.

Sometimes ants are repelled by laying a barrier of sodium fluoride along window sills, doors or foundations where they try to enter the house.

Combine above ingredients. Season with salt and pepper and shape into small flat patties. Coat with flour. Melt enough Crisco in skillet to cover bottom. Fry until browned on both sides. Cover skillet and cook very slowly for five minutes. Transfer patties to platter. If gravy is desired, stir 2 tablespoons flour into drippings left in skillet. Brown smoothly. Add 1 1/2 cups milk. Cook until gravy thickens.
