

Market Hits 3-Year High

AP Average up .2
At 52.7, Tops
Since 1939

NEW YORK, July 12.—(AP)—The stock market, on balance, worked its way to a new high for more than three years Monday as buyers turned to coppers, rails and a wide assortment of industrial specialties.

From the opening to mid-day prices were rather sketchy. Bids then arrived for carriers and, at the best, advances ranged from fractions to around two points. While many leaders failed to make the grade, plus marks were well in the majority at the close. Slow-downs were plentiful but dealings picked up at intervals.

Individual situations, continued investment demand and more than the ordinary war optimism received credit for the stiffening of trends. At that, some Wall streets still held aloof to await outcome of the Sicilian invasion.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up .2 of a point at 52.7, a new top for this barometer since November 3, 1939. The rail composite advanced .3 to 26.7, only .2 of a point under its highest figure since 1937, reached last May. A number of 1000 to 10,000-share blocks of low priced issues, usually unchanged, helped volume which amounted to 1,044,120 shares compared with 1,054,120 in the previous full session.

Scattered rail bonds tilted forward. At Chicago wheat was off 1/4 to 1/2 of a cent a bushel, oats up 1/4 to 1/2 and rye ahead 1/4 to 1/2. Hogs were 10 to 25 cents improved. Cotton was up 10 cents a bale to down five cents.

Creole Petroleum jumped 2 1/2 in the curb and lesser upturns were enjoyed by Gulf Oil, Cities Service, Venezuelan Petroleum and St. Regis Paper. The aggregate here was 370,260 shares versus 397,635 last Friday.

Wheat Trend Down Despite Late Upturn

CHICAGO, July 12.—(AP)—A week underdone prevailed in wheat Monday and final prices ranged to about a cent lower despite a late upturn which cancelled extreme losses. Rye was down with wheat early, but rallied sharply prior to the close when covering by previous short-sellers disclosed a lack of offerings. Oats were firm throughout the session. Persistent selling of wheat from cash and milling concerns was attributed to hedging, reflecting an expanded movement of grain in the southwest. Receipts at principal interior terminals today totaled 7,404,000 bushels against 4,462,000 bushels a year ago. Business at Winnipeg was a further depressing influence.

At the close wheat was 1/2 lower than Saturday's finish, July \$1.45 1/2, September \$1.45 1/2, \$1.46, oats were up 1/4 cent, July 72¢, and rye was ahead 1/4 cent, July \$1.13 1/2. Crop reports were favorable. Flour production continued at a heavy rate, the Northwestern Miller, trade publication, placing June output well above the same month last year. Visible supply of wheat increased 10,546,000 bushels during the week, bringing the total to 152,101,000 bushels. The generally strong feed grain picture, and prospect of higher prices for CCC feed wheat, supported oats. Rye trade was nervous with price trends changing quickly in a "thin" market.
