One-a-Week Traffic Death Toll in Oregon

At least one traffic death was reported in Oregon every week during the first six months of this year, according to Secretary of State Bob Farrell, who quoted the figures in answer to the opinion, often stated, that restricted driving automatically resulted in a strong reduction in the traffic death frequency in Oregon.

The longest deathless period in Oregon traffic during the first half of the year was the eight-day period April 23-30.

"An increase in the pedestrian fatality frequency is counter-balancing the decrease in fatalities involving the collision of motor vehicles or non-collision accidents," Farrell said. "Pedestrian fatalities now constitute nearly 50 per cent of the total traffic toll, whereas in normal times they amount to around one-third."

County Road Funds Share \$55,399.25

Marion county's share in the state department's distribution of \$800,000 in highway revenues, announced Friday, is \$55,399.25. The appropriation is made semi-annually. Of the \$120,000 to be distributed in December, Marion county will receive \$63,098.87.

Capitol Gun Sent to War Here Friday

The five-inch field piece of Spanish-American war vintage which has adorned the capitol grounds since 1921 was restored to active war service on Friday when it was turned over to the army to be converted into war munitions.

Gov. Earl Snil made a brief address of presentation and the gun was accepted by Col. E. I. Foster, Camp Adair salvage officer. The Trailblazer division band played a brief concert prior to the ceremony.

The state board of control hope to receive, following the war, a gun of more modern design to replace the one turned over to the army Friday.

State Motor Registrations Drop Slightly

Oregon motor vehicle registration for the first six months of this year dropped slightly more than one per cent. Secretary of State Bob Farrell said Friday. Registration now totals 395,997 vehicles, compared to 401,497 last year.

Trucks and buses continued to show increases over the registration figures for 1942. Trucks this year totaled 28,454, an increase of nearly four per cent over last year. Buses totaled 1,066, an increase of 31 per cent.

Private passenger cars numbered 318,006, a decrease of 6,400 vehicles from the registration for the first six months of last year. Total motor vehicle registration fees paid at the end of June were \$2,969,526.94.

Blast Kills Ship's Mate

RICHMOND, Calif., July 16—(AP)—An explosion aboard a Standard Oil company tanker Friday killed the ship's first mate and injured the chief mate and five seamen. The company identified the dead man as Norman H. Melanwan, 67, of Richmond. He was killed by debris when the boiler blew up.
