NEW YORK, July 16-(A)-Joe Medwick, only three years ago considered one of baseball's most valuable properties, Friday night was just another \$7500 ball play-

The New York Giants Friday claimed him from the Brooklyn Dodgers for that walver price, the transaction being the second in recent days involving a prominent Brooklyn athlete. Louis "Bobo" Newsom, pitcher, was traded to the St. Louis Inst Wednesday.

Medwick, after a spectacular career with the St. Louis Cardinals, on June 12, 1940, was the chief figure in a six-player, \$100,-000 transaction between the Car-dinals and Dodgers.

Medwick, now 31, came up to the Cardinals from Houston in 1932 to launch a spectacular bat-ting career that reached its peak in 1937, when he hit .374 to win the National league's most valuable player award.
