

Stocks Retain Week's Gains

Market Emerges on Solid Ground After Successful Session

NEW YORK, July 17 (AP)—The stock market Saturday emerged from a generally successful week on a solid ground despite further profit-taking on the recent rise to best average levels in nearly four years.

Throughout the six-session stretch the main buying inspiration stemmed from the exceptionally cheering war news. The pressure of idle investment funds continued to offset such liquidation as appeared.

The Associated Press 60-stock average was up .1 of a point at 53 today, and on the week showed a net advance of .5. Wednesday it hit a new peak since October 27, 1933, at 53.3. Dealings were slack during the brief proceedings and transfers of 397,040 shares were the fourth smallest of the year to date. They compared with 487,170 last Saturday.

Wheat Stages Minor Advance

Short Covering in Rye Pit, Which Off 10 Cents
CHICAGO, July 17 (AP)—Wheat staged a minor advance in the usual quiet Saturday trade, a let-up in hedging pressure from the southwest leaving the market with only moderate offerings. Traders showed little inclination to buy, however, and the grain drifted rather aimlessly most of the session. A little short covering came in to rye, which was off as much as 10 cents from its recent high, and the grain rallied slightly. At the close wheat was unchanged to 1/4 higher, July \$1.44 1/2, September \$1.44 3/4, oats were 1/4-1/2 lower, July 70 3/4, and rye was unchanged to 1/4 higher, July \$1.07. Diminished hedging pressure apparently reflected the fact farmers in the southwest were less inclined to sell their new wheat as prices in many areas had slumped below the loan level. More grain was going into the government loan and less into
