Hay Crop Here Biggest Ever Though Prices May Be High; Barley and Oats Yield Good

Though there may be truth in reports that nationally there is threat of a serious hay shortage and that dairymen in the north-west soon will have the entire 1943 crop purchased creating a shortage for livestock and general farming operations, it is true that in the Salem vicinity the biggest hay crop on record has been produced this year, dealers report.

In fact, some Salem dealers' reports contradict the statements published in Portland papers that there has been a "scramble" for hay. They declare that hay sufficient for their retail requirements is being offered, though the growers expect good prices.

In this vicinity it appears that farmers, recalling the shortage of hay last winter and spring, sowed greater acreages and harvested more of their oats and vetch for hay rather than for threshing; although it also is reported that the amount threshed will be above average. The season has been a good one for hay yield, it also is declared.

Relative to reports of remarkably high bids for vetch seed in this vicinity, suggesting a shortage of seed for the next crop, dealers said they believed these reports involved principally hairy vetch, and for the reasons that acreage of this variety has been dwindling, that it is expensive to produce because of heavy shattering, and that weevil infestation has been increasing. Hairy vetch is raised here almost exclusively for seed which goes to southern states.

Dealers said prices on vetch seed of the varieties commonly sown here for hay, had not to their knowledge advanced markedly above the government "support price" set last year.

Barley and oats crops are excellent in this vicinity but prices on the new crops are starting high; in the case of barley, because of brewers' demand, in that of oats principally because of the dearth of millrun and corn for feeding, which shifts the demand to this crop.

Niece Killed En Route Silverton To Visit Scotts

SILVERTON—While en route to visit her aunt and uncle, the Robert Scotts at Silverton, Mrs. Grace Dohring figured in an accident which caused her death at Seattle Saturday and the Scotts instead went to Seattle to attend her funeral.

Survivors are her parents, the George Scotts; a brother, James, and two sisters, Florence Scott of Los Angeles and Mrs. Haines of Salt Lake City.
