What they can do
What they're doing about it

Slated for an important job in the US navy hospital corps, recently opened to the WAVES, is Miss Patricia Ethel May Niemeyer, a graduate of Salem high school, who has completed her enlistment in the WAVES. It was reported here yesterday by Chief Otto R. Anderson of the US navy recruiting substation here, which handles WAVES applications in the Salem area.

Miss Niemeyer is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Niemeyer, 194 South Cottage street, Salem. The WAVES oath was given Miss Niemeyer at the Portland branch, Office of Naval Officer Procurement, 1233 American Bank building, Portland, which has charge of the enlistment of WAVES in Oregon, Southwestern Washington and Idaho.

Miss Niemeyer is awaiting assignment to the WAVES indoctrination school at Hunters college of Columbia university, New York city, after which she will be assigned to a naval hospital for her first tour of active duty and for more intensive training in the job which will enable her to replace a hospital corpsman for active duty at sea or at an advanced base. On reporting to the indoctrination school, she will receive the \$200 WAVE uniform allowance. Miss Niemeyer is among the first young women from Salem to enlist in the WAVES for service in the hospital corps.

Since September 1942, Miss Niemeyer has been laboratory technician at the Greene-Mangels clinic, 4212 NE Broadway, Portland.

She graduated from Salem high school in 1938, where she was active in the Crescendo club and the Big Sister club in her junior year.

Miss Niemeyer attended Willamette university from 1938 to 1941, majoring in biology. She was a member of Alpha Phi Alpha sorority, was business manager of the junior class play, was active in the AAUW and was a member of the a cappella choir. She received her training as a laboratory technician at the University of Oregon Medical school in Portland in 1941-42, majoring in laboratory science.

Miss Niemeyer precedes her brother into the US navy, Robert Henry Niemeyer, jr., who is scheduled to leave for a navy training camp on August 13.

She was in charge of emergency first aid for the Physicians and Surgeons Hospital association at nights while she was going to college. Miss Niemeyer is part of the medical service of the Portland Civilian Defense council, working with the University of Oregon Medical school unit. She is well known in medical circles for her scientific drawings.

Miss Niemeyer is a native of Salem, having been born here.

Lela Runcorn, 765 Marion street, has been accepted for enlistment in the women marine corps, she told Salem marine recruiters Thursday after passing her final examinations in Portland Wednesday. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Runcorn of Gervais, was graduated from Gervais high school in 1938 and for the last year and a half has been employed at Woodworth's in Salem. She has returned to Salem to await call for indoctrination training.

Spices Pep up Daily Menu

Investigate the possibilities of your spice cupboard. A little curry powder, a bit a sage, or perhaps a barbecue sauce may be the cue to success next time you're preparing a "new" dish. Try some of the thrifty cuts of meat, properly prepared for flavor and tenderness, served attractively, and see if the family doesn't lick the platter clean.

BARBECUED SHORT RIBS
3 pounds short ribs
2 tablespoons lard

1 medium onion
1/4 cup vinegar
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1 cup catsup
1/2 cup water
3 tablespoons Worcestershire Sauce (optional)
1 teaspoon prepared mustard
1/2 cup diced celery
2 teaspoons salt
Have ribs cut into sections two to three inches long. Brown in hot lard. Brown minced onion. Add all remaining ingredients to short ribs. Cover and cook slowly, or bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees).

BAKED SUMMER SQUASH

1 1/2 pounds peeled sliced squash
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons chopped onions
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1 cup cooked green beans
1/4 cup cream or rich milk
Mix ingredients. Bake 35 minutes in covered casserole. Uncover and bake five minutes to brown top.

Idea for that spaghetti supper party you're having: Take an unsliced loaf of bread, cut down the center lengthwise but don't cut clear through to the bottom crust. Slash down crosswise five or six times, spread with melted butter or margarine in which a clove of garlic has been floating, then pop into the hot oven for 15 or 20 minutes. It's hot, it's crusty and as you break off hunks there's the whiff of garlic so in keeping with a meat-ball-and-spaghetti supper.

Add a nip of curry powder to creamed dried beef. Serve on hot biscuits and for the seasoned short cake theme bake the biscuit dough in a sheet and cut in squares. A heartening dish.

Sausage Makes Covered Dish

Often forgotten, hominy is an excellent cereal for a change, and adds interesting variety to the daily menu. Here is a recipe where it is combined with pork. An excellent dish for a picnic or "covered dish" dinner, this will make the most out of the meat scraps.

SAUSAGE AND HOMINY

1/2 pound pork sausage links
1 tablespoon minced green pepper
1 tablespoon minced onion
2 tablespoons drippings
2 cups cooked hominy
Place sausage in a frying pan. Add 1/4 cup water. Cover. Steam five minutes. Drain, cook slowly. Turn to brown evenly. Heat green pepper and onion in drippings. Add hominy. Heat. Serve sausage on mound of hominy. Serves four.

Leftovers Hide in Meat Cakes

Crisp meat cakes disguise leftovers beyond recognition and can be made in a jiffy. Put through the meat-grinder leftover meat from roast beef, lamb or veal. Add one lightly beaten egg, salt and pepper and a dash of Worcestershire sauce. Form into flat cakes. Dip into egg beaten with a spoonful of milk, then into crushed cornflakes. Fry in hot fat until golden brown on both sides.
