

Grains Weaken As Rye Drops

Session Marked by Nervous Undertone; Buying Orders Scarce

CHICAGO, Aug. 12—(P)—After exhibiting a nervous undertone in the closing minutes Thursday when a sudden selling spurge in rye found that market with a scarcity of buying orders, rye plunged to new lows for the current movement and wheat and oats eased down below the previous close.

The late sell-off in rye, following uneasiness earlier, was an exact duplication of Wednesday's action. Once again traders attributed the major part of the selling to houses with eastern connections. Reasons for the break were also similar—selling by holders discouraged over prospect of feeding and distilling demand for the grain.

Final prices were slightly above the session's lows, but still well under Wednesday's close. Rye finished 1-1/4 lower, September 96%, wheat was unchanged to 3/4 lower, September \$1.43, and oats were 1/4-3/4 down, September 68%.

The Commodity Credit corporation returned 1,000,000 bushels of requisitioned corn to those parties from whom it had been requisitioned. In addition, the CCC was selling corn it had purchased in the last few days back to original sellers, providing it was distributed promptly to areas in need of feed. The CCC said it had several million bushels of such corn.

While such sales can hardly amount to much when the heavy feeding demand is considered, they were sufficient to unnerve rye traders. With expiration of the date upon which corn marketings could be made and share in any increase in ceilings up to Oct. 31, country offerings fell off. Bookings totaled around 73,000 bushels.

Wheat exhibited considerable resistance and generally gave a better account of itself than oats or rye.

Big Horn Forest Fire Spreading

BUFFALO, Wyo., Aug. 12—(P)—Another attempt to control a raging fire in the Big Horn national forest by backfiring failed Thursday, and Supt. J. F. Conner said he probably would ask officials at Fort Warren, Cheyenne, for 200 more soldiers to help stop the fire.

The fire, which had been burning nearly two weeks, spread over an additional 500 acres today, bringing the flame-swept area to 8200 acres.

Scouts were sent out to reconnoiter the entire fire line to determine where to base new efforts, but when the backfire failed Conner reported that the flames even burned through the plowed fire line.

Expert fire fighters from three states are leading 250 soldiers besides ranch volunteers. The Denver regional office sent 12 fire fighters, several arrived from Missoula, Mont., and Wyoming experts are on the scene.

Mexicans to Get Hourly Pear Wage

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 12—(P)—After a brief work stoppage in protest against the pay basis, pear growers agreed Thursday to compensate Mexican pickers on an hourly basis instead of by the box.

When the pickers got into spot-pickers they found it impossible to earn enough for a living, a spokesman said. The growers then agreed to pay them 75 cents an hour instead of 8 and 10 cents a box.

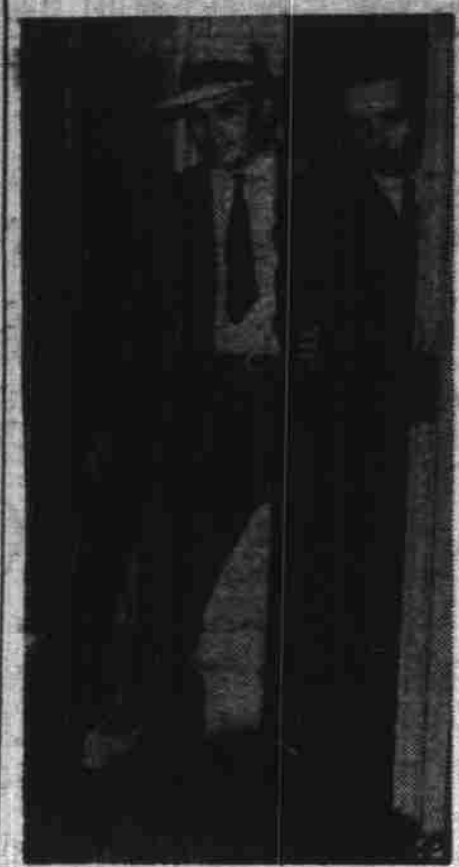
The stoppage was confined to a single orchard.

Trio Accused, Counterfeit

SEATTLE, Aug. 12—(P)—Charges of possessing counterfeit money were filed today against three men in connection with what Capt. William P. Jarrell of the secret service described as an expertly organized counterfeiting plot.

The charges were filed against Marion J. Williams, Joel L. Parson and Harold K. Ashby. Jarrell said Williams was suspected as actual printer of the expertly faked \$10 and \$20 bills. The officer said 175 of the \$10 bills were found in his hotel room. He said the other two men were held as alleged passers of the bogus currency.

Jarrell reported the seizure of elaborate printing equipment in a basement of a Bremerton home where Williams had living quarters.

Panels to Adjust Price Complaints

PORTLAND, Ore., August 12—(P)—Price panels of rationing boards in 16 Oregon and Washington cities in the Portland OPA district were empowered by District Director Richard G. Montgomery Thursday night to adjust complaints on price matters.

Through the panel plan, Montgomery explained, the OPA hopes to hold the line against rising prices and inflation, giving local panels authority to deal with price adjustment matters on a friendly, cooperative basis is expected to lessen need for enforcement action, Montgomery said.

The panels are in Portland, Salem, Bend, Eugene, Hillsboro, Independence, McMinnville, Newberg, Sandy, Seaside, Sheridan, Stayton, Vernonia and Woodburn in Oregon, and in Camas and Vancouver, Wash.

England to Observe 4th War Anniversary

LONDON, Thursday, Aug. 12—(P)—King George VI directed today that September 3, fourth anniversary of the start of the war, be observed as "a national day of prayer and dedication."

An announcement from Buckingham palace said, "It is the desire of his majesty the king that Friday, September 3, being the fourth anniversary of the outbreak of war, should be observed as a national day of prayer and dedication."

Mary Jane Hall, 58, widow of Thomas W. Hall and a resident of Salem since 1917, died Thursday at her home, 1506 Ferry, following a brief illness.

Following the death of her first husband, George W. Myers, she came to Salem from Philadelphia with her son, William T. Myers, then a small boy. In 1920 she was married to Thomas W. Hall at the home of her brother, Prof. T. S. Roberts. Mr. Hall died last September.

Mrs. Hall had a wide group of friends and acquaintances, some of whom were first attracted by the array of flowers, particularly roses, around the residence at 16th and Ferry streets. Because of her fondness for flowers and for people, she was generous with the produce of her gardens, sending bouquets to many of the ill in this area.

Survivors, in addition to the son, include a daughter, Edna Dunsworth, and one grandson, David; brothers, Thomas S., Sol W. and Hugh W. Roberts, all of Salem; Dr. R. M. Roberts of San Diego; sisters, Mrs. Malcolm Ramp, Portland, and Mrs. L. C. Zanders of Oakland, Calif.

Fishing Boat Lost Off BC

VANCOUVER, BC, Aug. 12—(CP)—The former fishboat B. C. Star, under charter to the royal Canadian air force, has disappeared off the British Columbia coast with a crew of 15 RCAF personnel and it is feared that all have been lost. Next-of-kin have been notified and names will be issued shortly.

Time of the disappearance of the vessel has not been disclosed, but it is believed to have been within the past two weeks. Last Sunday the skipper of the small British Columbia packers ship Tecu was asked by RCAF officers if he had seen any trace of the B. C. Star. He had not.
