Peace Shares Lead Market

Steels Make Small Gains; Aircrafts And Rails Mixed

By BERNARD S. O'HARA NEW YORK, August 18 -(AP)-Shares which have become popular as a result of the recent shift to peace thinking in Wall Street gave the stock market its principal leadership Wednesday.

Closing advances ranged from fractions to around 2 points in rubbers, farm implements, motors and merchandising issues. Steels made small gains. Aircrafts and rails were mixed.

Dealings amounted to 560,191 shares against 553,306 yesterday but brokers pointed out that August normally brings a considerable drop in activity.

Some of the good advances today were based on news developments. American Telephone moved up 11/8 after announcement of the usual \$2.25 quarterly dividend. Goodrich climbed 2 on a favorable earnings statement for the first half of the year and Goodyear rose 34, also on a pleasing income statement.

Cereal Buying Holds Despite Talk of Using Sugar for Alcohol

By WILLIAM FERRIS CHIGAGO, August 18-(AP)-With rye staging its strongest upturn in several weeks, all grains displayed an improved undertone Wednesday. Rye was up as much as 3 cents at one time before encountering resistance and wheat

and oats advanced more than a

While many traders felt the sharp gains in rye resulted mainly from the fact the grain appeared oversold, there was some hope that rye would be wanted by distillers. At the close rye was 11/2-23/4 higher, September 991/4-36, wheat was up 1-1%,-September \$1.44%-%, and oats were ahead 1-1%, September 7014-36.

The war production board was discussing larger imports of sugar and molasses to take the place of wheat in alcohol production, trade reports stated. However, many grain men felt plants not located along the eastern seaboard would turn to rye in case their wheat supplies were reduced.

In back of the proposal to substitute sugar and molasses, it was said, was a statement by the war food administration to the WPB that wheat supplies next season will be as tight as corn suppplies are at present. This fact encouraged buying of the bread cereal, despite the possibility the grain might not be used as extensively as in the past in alcohol manufac-

Demand for cash oats was strong and prices advanced. Shipping sales totaled around 50,000 bushels. With country marketings of corn again declining to small proportions, commercial feed manufacturers were said to be taking oats because of their inability to obtain the maize. Ceiling prices were asked for lard but there were no bids at that level.
