To Get Recaps

"List B" trucks—those general-ly classed as not directly essential to the war effort-are now eligible for tire recapping service and new tubes, Richard G. Montgomery, OPA district director, anunced Tuesday. This applies to all "list B" trucks, used for any

purpose whatsoever. The amendment, effective September 2, relieves local war price and rationing boards of the responsibility for investigating the essentiality of operations of "list B" trucks within local communi-

"Although this is an improvement insofar as making recapping material available to this class of trucks, the acute shortage of tires does not permit allotment of replacement tires," Montgomery emphasized.

"These trucks," he explained, "are in the class generally described as not directly essential to the war effort but nevertheless in most cases are important to the life of the community in which they rae operated. Direct consumer deliveries of bread, groceries, laundry, etc., in which services such trucks are used, as well as wholesale deliveries in the same categories, are considered by OPA to be essential to the community."



He was born in Clatson county, educated largely by his brilliant mother, attended school at Bishop Scott academy in Portland and Astoria high school, and was appointed to West Point from this state.
