The navy chiefs were granted permission to assist Sparks by Willamette Station Commander Lt. George C. Bliss with the stipulation that any and all football assistance by the pair not interfere in any way with naval duties. Both Trotter and Carroll are tied up from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily, but are available otherwise. The chiefs volunteered their services to assist with the directorship of football until a coach is

Director Sparks last night announced official football practice will be called on September 10 in compliance with Northwest conference rules.
