Call No. 13 was from a downtown beer parlor and coffee shop, where a man had fallen in the doorway. The fact that one ear, which had hit the pavement, was bleeding was reason for calling the first aid car. Clark refused to pick up the man and provide ambulance space and service in the red mercy car, but, instead, called the police to the expressed disgust of onlookers.

Officers agreed with Clark that the "patient" apparently needed jail accommodations and an opportunity to sleep off a drunk rather than first aid.
