Mrs. Scott Dies At Monmouth; Rite Friday

MONMOUTH — Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 p. m. in the Smith-Baum chapel at Independence for Mrs. R. A. Scott, 77, who died at the family home October 9. Eva M. Bruette was born in Iowa January 20, 1866. After spending her early life in that state, she and her husband brought their family west and lived briefly at Scio. In 1918 they bought a general store at Buena Vista, Polk county, operating it for 18 years.

Mrs. Scott had had no previous merchandising experience, and due to her husband's impaired health she took over most of the business responsibility. She went in debt \$2400 for her stock of goods and in three years was able to build her own building. She was postmistress, served meals to the public, and carried a general stock of everything, including hardware.

When she retired from business in 1936 she owned five pieces of property.

During her lifetime, she had contact with three major wars: her father, John Bruette, was a member of the 33rd Iowa infantry in the Civil war; her son, John, was overseas in World war one, and her youngest son, Clarence Roy, is now at a training camp in Texas. Surviving are her widower and their sons: Irvin Scott of Salem; Floyd, Jefferson; Glenn, Hoquiam, Wash.; John, Independence, and Roy in Texas.

The Rev. Jesse Baker of Independence will officiate. Burial will be made in Fir Crest cemetery, here.
