APPLE PAN DOWDY
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 pounds pared, sliced apples
1/2 cup New Orleans molasses
3 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup water

Line casserole with pie crust. Mix sugar, spices and salt and sprinkle over apples. Fill casserole with apples, add molasses, butter and water. Cover with punctured pie crust, tuck edges together, press to sides of casserole. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 30 minutes. Remove from oven. With spoon, break top crust in pieces and fold them into apple filling. Return to oven and bake 15 minutes at 350 degrees F. (or until apples are tender). Serves 6 to 8.
