# **Stocks Divide** Gains, Losses

#### Call for Specialties Offsets Profit-Taking; Trade Relatively Light

By BERNARD S. O'HARA NEW YORK, Oct. 18-(AP)-Demand for specialties served as an offset for profit taking in most of today's stock market leaders.

Mild irregularity prevailed at the start. Closing gains and losses of fractions were about evenly split although a few isolated favorites jumped 4 points or so. Dealings were relatively light through-

Earnings prospects, as much as anything else, apparently motivated buyers.

The Associated Press 60-stock average was unchanged at 50.4. Of 763 issues traded, 280 were up, 279 down and 204 unchanged. Transfers totalled 540,645 chares compared with 555,600 in the previous full session.

American Distilling was a star performer, climbing 4% points to a new 1943 top. Western Union also touched its best level for the year but finished up only 1/6 of a point. The majority of the rails slipped.

#### **Kwantung Chinese** Near Starvation Is Relief Agency Word

Nine-tenths of the population of the Sz Yap district of Kwantung Province in China-original home of many Chinese in the United States - are near starvation, according to United China Relief, member agency of the National War Fund.

To help relieve the acute want, \$370,000 has been sent there, but a great deal more is needed.

The famine is a result of prolonged drought and crop failure, and the Japanese blockade of the coastline. This region has never been able to support its normal population of 2,000,000 and it had, in addition, the burden of feeding several hundred thousand refugees from Canton and Hongkong.

# Oats Weak

Distilling, Feeding Demand Boost Bread Cereal to Season High

By WILLIAM FERRIS CHICAGO, Oct. 18-(AP)-Distilling and feeding demand for wheat, coupled with a broader commis sion house interest, gave the bread cereal gains ranging to about a cent today. Rye was up with wheat, but oats displayed weak-

The market opened strong when an unusually small number of selling orders entered the pits. When December wheat reached \$1.57, however, a fair volume of selling was uncovered and the market backed down. Prior to the close another sharp upturn developed.

At the finish wheat was %-1% higher, December \$1.561/4-1/8, May \$1.541/4-1/4, rye was up 1/4-1%, December \$1.13%-%, oats were lower to % higher and barely closed 114-134 lower.

All deliveries of wheat hit new seasonal highs and sold at the best levels since the boom days of the late 1920s.

The strong demand for cash wheat was illustrated by visible supply figures. The supply decreased 6,201,000 bushels last week to 156,050,000 bushels. In the same week last year, the visible supply increased 524,000 to 221,-740,000 bushels.

The Commodity Credit corporaton was revealed to have purchased only 36,739,000 bushels of wheat in the July 1-Oct. 9 period against sales of 134,832,000 bush-




