Pancakes Are Fancy Now

Here's a way to make something out of the ordinary pancake flour, that comes from the grocer's already mixed. By adding other ingredients we get something special.

APPLE PANCAKES

(Makes 20 pancakes)
Time: 3 minutes for each cake.

- 2 cups ready-mixed pancake flour.
2 cups milk.
1 beaten egg.
2 tablespoons melted shortening.

- 1 cup apples, cut in small pieces.
1/2 cup sugar.
2 tablespoons cinnamon.

Add milk, beaten egg and melted shortening to ready-mix, mixing lightly. Batter should be somewhat lumpy. Fold in apples. Grease griddle lightly. Pour batter onto hot griddle using 1/4 cup batter for each pancake. Bake each side until golden brown, about 3 minutes for each cake. Put small pat of butter on each pancake and sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar mixture. Serve immediately.

The cinnamon-sugar topping is an excellent pancake treat, for the delicate spicy flavor complements tart apples sprinkled in these pancakes.

Phone Company Gives to Chests

The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company is contributing \$135,000 — a special contribution of \$85,000 to the National War Fund together with the company's usual annual contributions totaling \$50,000 to Community Chests — to the current United War Fund drive, according to announcement by N. R. Powley, president, just received by R. N. Nixon, telephone manager here.

The company's National War Fund contribution has been apportioned to the counties in which it serves in Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho and Nevada, closely following the allocation basis on which the county quotas were established by the National War Fund organization. On this basis, Marion county's allocation was \$400, and a check for this amount, together with the usual Community Chest contribution of \$150, was turned over to the county chairman by Mr. Evans.

In addition, telephone employee contributions have totaled \$369.

FOOD

Canned Goods — Blue stamps X, Y, Z valid until Nov. 20.

Meat, cheese, canned fish and edible fats — Brown stamps C, D, E and F good until October 28.

Sugar — Coupon No. 14, 15 and 16 expire October 31, good for 5 pounds. Stamp 20 in book 1 good for 5 pounds until January 13.

SHOES Stamp No. 12, book one, good indefinitely. Airplane stamp No. 1 valid Nov. 1.

GASOLINE

Book A coupons No. 8 now good for three gallons each.

FUEL OIL Period 1 coupons in new fuel oil rations valid through January 3. Coupons with gallons printed on the face valid for amount indicated until expiration date shown on coupon sheet.

TIRES Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 2 months; B books every 4 months; A books every 8 months. Commercial motor vehicle inspections every 6 months or every 5000 miles.

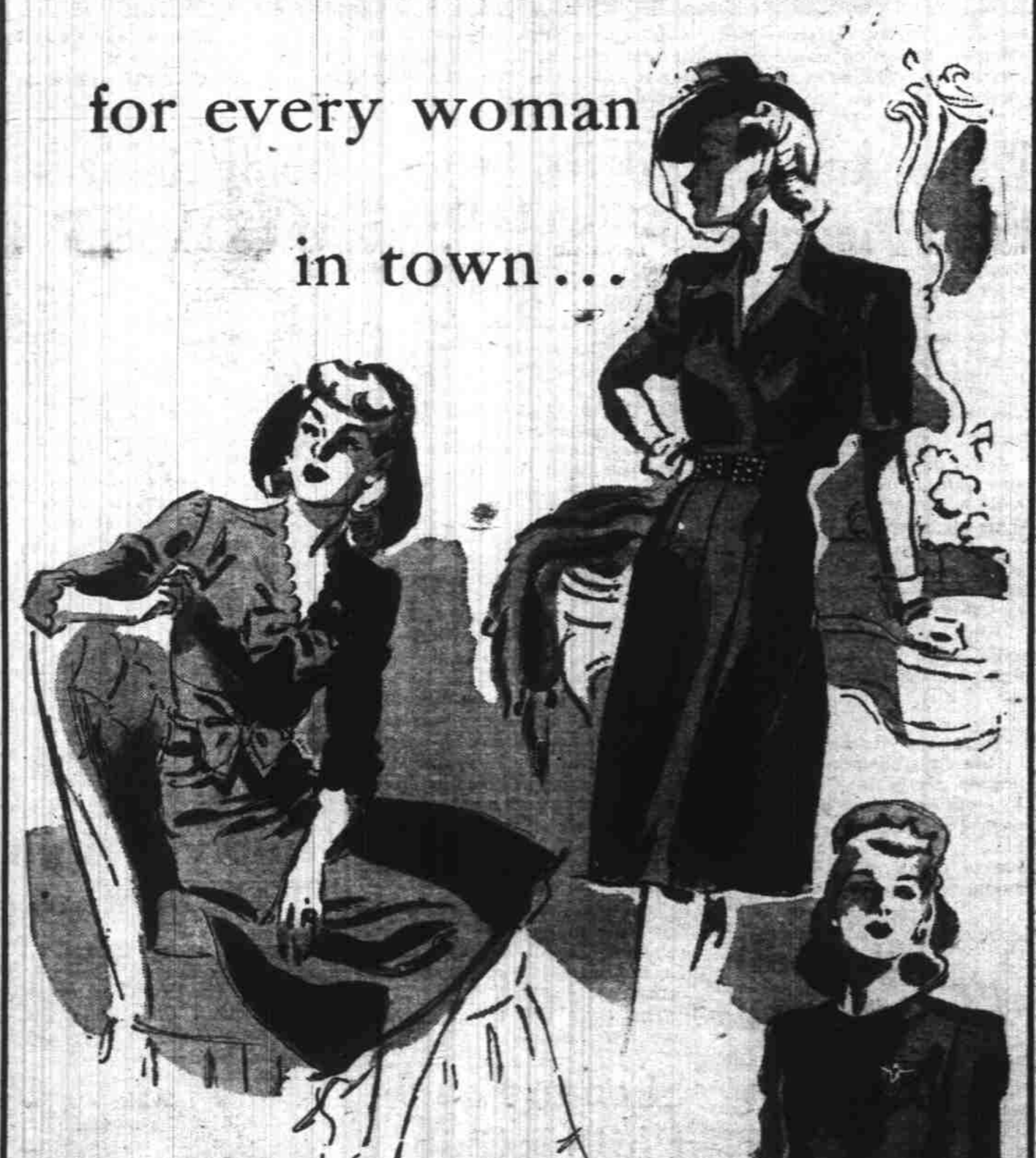
