# Educator, Dies

LA GRANDE, Nov. 6-(AP)-Dr. Verne V. Caldwell, Portland, dean and director of the general extension division of the state system of higher education, died in the hospital here Thursday. He was 46.

Caldwell, who collapsed in the Blue mountains shortly after bringing down an elk and deer. was rushed to La Grande Saturday for an emergency operation for ruptured gastric ulcers.

He is survived by the widow, Bessie, two daughters, and a son now in the marine corps.

Caldwell, a professor of paycholoby and education at Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland for five years, and professor of psychology at Oregon College of Education, Monmouth, for eight, was appointed to his position as dean-director in 1940. Funeral services will be held

here Monday.
