Blood Donors Needed—One hundred blood donors are needed if Tuesday's visit of the mobile unit from the Portland plasma center of the Red Cross is to be as successful as it has been in recent weeks. It was announced here Friday. Salem's weekly quota has been raised from the original 120 to 140 persons. A still larger number should register for two reasons, according to E. J. Scellars, who represents the American Legion in the activity: some persons always are detained by unexpected illnesses or failure of transportation or are refused because they cannot meet all health requirements; others move through the process so rapidly that more than 140 persons can be handled on the average day if there are more than 140 present. Red Cross offices here will make appointments for as many as 160 donors and will promise that no one appearing at the time assigned will be delayed long.
