'Who' and 'What' Of Grid Battles

NEW YORK, Nov. 20—(AP)—Notre Dame moved within one game of its first perfect season since 1930 in today's outstanding football tilt but while the Irish were nosing out the Iowa Seahawks, 14-13, a few other important arguments were settled on the nation's grid-irons.

Michigan's Wolverines, beaten only by Notre Dame in a non-conference tilt, and Purdue's Boilermakers wound up in a tie for the Western conference title with the latter accounting for their ninth successive victory in their first unbeaten year since 1929. Michigan rolled over Ohio State, 45-7, and Purdue beat back Indiana 7-0.

Kansas, with just a so-so season, came to the aid of the idle (Continued on Page 16)

# Former World's Champ Added to Wagner-Ross Mat Title Rematch Tuesday

Another first - cabin ramlin' fiesta for village mat followers Tuesday night, no less.

Matchmaker Don Owens, who's been doing a fine job in cooking up the thrillers for the customers of late, yesterday announced that Sgt. Billy Goetz, of Chicago but now in the army and stationed in Washington and who in 1935-39 held the light-heavyweight championship of the world, has been added to the upcoming card. Goetz, strictly a scientific gent in fights has been matched with Pierre "Frenchy" La Belle, another musician who needs no instruction to local mat follow-

ers as a cleanie who knows and uses almost every legitimate hold listed in the wrestler's manual.

The Goetz - LaBelle session will occupy the semi-windup spot in the Coast championship rematch between village Tough Tony Ross and Gorgeous George Wagner, himself expected to develop into merely the most slam-bang biffero ever seen here. If the rematch is anything like the session ripped off by Messrs. Ross and Wagner last week, the city gendarme department had best assign a few more of its personnel to the Ferry street garden Tuesday

night. Blood and thunder brawling just isn't the right name for it when Tough Tony and Gorgeous George lock horns. And especially this time since Wagner, winner via foul last week, up and demanded the rematch because he figured it would be the only way he'd have of repeating Ross for the frightful beating he got from Tony last week.

Owens also announced that he had checked a minor request by Wagner that Billy Goetz be signed as referee Tuesday night. Reported Owens: "Wagner seems set on giving Ross the works and wants pal McElin as the

referee. They're buddies, you know, as both are from Texas. And as McElin does on the rough stuff himself, Wagner insisted he ref. Ross sanctioned the whole thing, incidentally."

Meanwhile, the pride of 4-Corners, whose mad bull performance turned the sock temple today - turvy last week, is diligently bearing down with his workouts so as to be "ready to fix Mr. Wagner up again."

Ross knows that win, lost or draw this time, it'll be his last session with Wagner. Preferring chicken to feathers, Tough Tony will be going all out after the belt. "Hell, the law of averages

ought to be taking care of me before long," he exclaimed yesterday.

Even the 2:30 p. m. curtain-raiser Tuesday should stack up as one of the better matches, for Owen has pitted Jack "Pin-Up Boy" Kiser with Milton Adalpus Olson. "Kiser deserves more than a preliminary role, but since he's so popular here it's best to at least have him on the card some place. These other two matches being what they are there just wasn't any other place left for Jack. He grabbed it in a hurry, though, for he likes to wrestle around here," reported Owen.

# Great Rambler Eleven Comes From Behind

Placekicks by Earley Bring Thrilling Win

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 20—(AP)—Little Fred Earley, an 18-year-old navy V-12 trainee, today placekicked two vital extra points after a pair of last half touchdowns to give Notre Dame a 14-13 victory over the pro-powered Iowa Seahawks.

A crowd of 45,000 went wild as Notre Dame climaxed a terrific uphill struggle to win its ninth straight game after spotting the Seahawks seven points in the first period.

The Irish, with Great Lakes next Saturday standing between them and their first undefeated season since 1930, today were stamped as one of the best, if not the best, team in the school's lush football history.

Only four yards short of a touchdown, the halftime whistle ended Notre Dame's chances of tying the score. But the Irish forgot that heartbreaking incident and rolled to two second half touchdowns.

The Seahawks, going down to their first defeat in nine starts used their five former pros the greater part of the game. Dick Todd of Texas Aggies and a Washington Redskins star for four years provided the most power, carrying the ball 13 times, for 78 yards and completing two passes for 40 yards. He was carried from the field suffering a broken jaw in the last period during Notre Dame's touchdown drive.

# Viks, Democrats in Turkey Tussle, Sweetland Thursday

Season Finale Set for 1 p.m.

The fourth and final football dish of the season for still hungry pigskin followers comes to pass this week on Sweetland field when Salem high's 50-50 Viks swap tackles with the power-laden Portland Jefferson high Democrats Thursday. The awaited grid morsel, tabbed for a 1 p.m. start will serve as one course of the Turkey Day doin's hereabouts.

Coach T. Drynan's up-and-downers, victorious four times, second best another four and tied once in their nine outings this season, will be forced to the limit Thursday if advance notices from the Rose City are correct. Although the Demos wound up third in Portland prep play, they are looked upon in many circles as at present the best eleven in the lot. A shaky start nullified a sizzling finish by Coach Eric Waldorf's lads.

The Democrat line is a little on the weighty side — it averages near the 180-pound per mark — but will be outweighed by the big Salems some five pounds per pillar. What is lost to the Viks in the line is more than made up in the Jeff backfield, however, since it hefts an average of close to 170 pounds per and presents two of the highest scoring threats in the Portland league in 190-pound Fullback Floyd Simmons and Right Half Harold Ellmers.

Simmons was first in Portland league scoring with 64 points over the season and was termed a good bet to make All-City. Ellmers was fifth in the scoring standings with 36 points, and although weighing only 139 is reported as being one of those here - he - is - there - he - goes type rompers.

On the other hand, the Viks, who are capable of playing A-1 football, came through the Friday night Medford 0-0 deadlock in top shape. They'll probably be the same for the Demos. There's even a possibility navy-bound Tex Worley, the Viks' rugged tackle will be on hand for the finale via holiday leave, and if he is the T-men will have one of the better linemen in the state to toss against the vaunted Jeff offense.

# Pelicans Crush Mac Hi, 34-0, Enter State Grid Title Final

BEND, Ore., Nov. 20—(AP)—The beefy Klamath Falls Pelicans steamrollered Milton-Freewater's Mac-Hi gridsters, 34-0, on this neutral field today to go into the finals of the state high school football championship play-off.

The Pelicans will meet either Milwaukie or Grant of Portland for the title.

Southern Oregon's champions, undefeated in two years, had too much weight and power for the eastern Oregon representative. They ripped over the tackles and swept around the ends with as many as five men conveying the ball carrier.

Klamath Falls took a Mac-Hi punt to its own 38 and in nine ground plays had scored before the game was more than five minutes old. The Pelicans, using the second string part of the time, pushed over two more touchdowns in the second quarter, another in the third and one more in the fourth.

Elwin Silva, fleet halfback, and Henry Shortgren, 180-pound full-

back, accounted for three of Klamath's five touchdowns and most of its 17 first downs.
