A colorful seal, picturing a little girl dreaming of Santa Claus, will appear on a million or more letters this Christmas season. This year's Christmas seal is one of simplicity and charm, designed by Andre Dugo. The artist explains that he designed the seal, because he loves children and is a firm believer in Santa Claus.

Symbolic of the happiness that lies within sight of children the seal depicts the protected child, dreaming of good things soon to be here, of the child that needs protection against a spectre that lurks around the corner—always.

The Santa of the seal scorns earthly things as reins for his steed—he sails across the sky, skimming the clouds, with heavy pack on his back. He's the same Santa that children have believed in for hundreds of years.

Symbolic of protection for the child, is the double barred cross. The cross that represents protective education and prevention and care of tuberculosis, the disease that snuffs out the lives of so many children every year. For 36 years Americans have bought Christmas seals to raise funds for tuberculosis sufferers and those who might have had it. For 36 years the number of deaths from the disease has steadily dropped. Tuberculosis, like other diseases, hits hardest and most often after a war. Now as never before, money is needed to keep up our counter-attack against this disease.

Every seal that is sold keeps faith with the little girl at the window — let's keep her believing in Santa Claus.
