BAKED FIG PUDDING

2 cups dried figs 1/4 cup shortening ½ cup sugar

1 egg, beaten

1 teaspoon vanilla 11/2 cups sifted flour

2 teaspoons baking powder ½ teaspoon salt

cup milk Cover dried figs with boiling water, let stand 10 minutes, ther drain and snip into pieces, using scissors. Cream shortening and sugar until fluffy. Add egg and vanilla. Sift flour, baking powder and salt, and add alternately with milk, beating well after each addition. Stir in figs. Bake in greased baking dish or 8-inch square pan in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 1 hour. Serves 6 to 8. Serve hot with your favorite pudding sauce. This one is especially good with it.

VINEGAR SAUCE 11/2 cups water 1 tablespoon butter or margarine

1/2 cup sugar Few grains salt 11/2 tablespoons cornstarch

½ teaspoon nutmeg ½ teaspoon vanilla 1 tablespoon vinegar (or lem-

Heat water and butter or margarine to boiling. Mix sugar, salt and corn starch, add all at once to boiling liquid and cook ,stirring constantly, until clear and thickened. Flavor to taste with nutmeg, vanilla and vinegar, and serve hot. Serves 6.


