Reason: Pfc. Ernie Keinholz of L company is one of the two or three people alive who know the location of a cache of thousands of bottles of the finest French wines, buried just before the German invasion of France.

The fabulous hoard was buried in feverish haste by a Swiss uncle of Keinholz, employed as caretaker of the large estates near St. Nazaire. The wealthy owner and his employe, working furiously, salvaged what they could of the priceless wine cellar. Selecting a remote site in the orchard, they dug the wines under.

Only a few trusted friends and relatives were told the location of the hidden treasure, among them Keinholz.




