Today's Menu

Coconut pudding is the dessert for today and will make use of the fresh coconut available at the grocer's.

- Green bean salad
- Broiled lamb cakes
- Glazed apples slices
- Browned potatoes
- Buttered spinach
- Baked coconut pudding

The coconut we buy in the stores is actually the kernel of the nut, and you may have to dig it out of the brown coconut fiber covering. Use a heavy blunt knife or a screwdriver and a hammer to get the outside shell opened up. When you get the brown coconut out, punch two of the eyes with an ice pick and pour out the "milk" to use as a drink. Then split the nut into pieces, using the punched holes as a starting point. Pry out the meat, pare off the thin brown skin or not, as you prefer, and grate it on the finest grater.

BAKED COCONUT PUDDING

- 1/4 cup flour
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 2 egg yolks
 - 2 cups milk
 - Peeled rind 1 lime
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1 cup grated fresh coconut
 - 2 egg whites
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 4 tablespoons sugar
- Mix flour, sugar and salt. Add slightly beaten egg yolks and mix to a paste. Scald milk in double boiler, stir into flour and egg mixture. Return to double boiler and stir constantly until thickened. Peel lime, keeping rind in one piece if possible. Add to thickened custard. Cover and cook for 15 minutes. Remove lime peel, add vanilla and stir in freshly grated coconut. Pour into a baking dish, top with meringue made of egg whites, salt and sugar. Bake in a slow oven (325 degrees) for 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Serve warm or cold. Serves 6.

Canned Goods — Green stamps A, B and C in book 4 good through December 20.
Meat, cheese, canned fish and edible fats — Brown stamps L, M, N, and P good until January 1.
Sugar Stamp 29 in book 4 good for 5 pounds until January 13.

SHOES
Stamp No. 18, book one, good indefinitely. Airplane stamp No. 1 valid now.

GASOLINE
Book A coupons No. 8 now good for three gallons each.

FUEL OIL
Period 1 coupons in new fuel oil rations valid through January 3. Coupons with gallonage printed on the face valid for amount indicated until expiration date shown on coupon sheet.

TIRES
Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months. B books every 4 months. Books every 8 months. Commercial motor vehicles have tire inspections every 1 month or every 5000 miles.

STOVES
Purchaser must get certificate at ration board for new stove.

Dicken's Tale Best Seller After 100 Years

NEW YORK, Dec. 20—(AP)—Charles Dickens, "A Christmas Carol," ended its first 100 year Saturday as a best seller.

"A most prodigious success"—Dickens' own description of the reception given his Christmas ghost story, which sold 6,000 copies within a few days of publication during the Christmas season of 1843—is still appropriate this Christmas season of 1943.

The nation's book shops reported "The Carol" still ranked high on Christmas book lists, and Dean Frank Luther Mott of the school of journalism of the University of Missouri, said that well over 2,000,000 copies had been

sold in the United States since publication.

"Dickens was the best selling author in the history of American publishing," said Dean Mott, an authority on best sellers in America. "Nine of his novels sold more than 1,000,000 each in this country, and seven more around a half-million. But 'A Christmas Carol' tops them all and is among the dozen best selling books ever offered by American booksellers.

"It is still the most popular Christmas story outside of the Bible."
