4 tablespoons sugar

Mix flour, sugar and salt. Add slightly beaten egg yolks and mix to a paste. Scald milk in double boiler, stir into flour and egg mixture. Return to double boiler and stirr constantly until thickened. Peel lime, keeping rind in one piece if possible. Add to thickened custard. Cover and cook for 15 minutes. Remove lime peel, add vanilla and stir in freshly grated coconut. Pour into a baking dish, top with meringue made of egg whites, salt and sugar. Bake in a slow oven (325 degrees) for 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Serve warm or cold. Serves 6.
