222 Killed In Accidents During 1943

Oregon's traffic accident toll in 1943 included 222 lives lost and 4850 persons injured in approximately 30,750 accidents, according to preliminary figures, subject to revision, released Tuesday by Secretary of State Bob Farrell.

The fatality toll of 222 deaths is an 18 per cent reduction from the toll of 273 lives in 1942. The injury toll is a five per cent decrease from the 5141 persons hurt in accidents in 1942. The total of 30,750 accidents represents a decrease of 18 per cent.

The pedestrian death toll rose sharply in 1943, standing at 80 lives lost compared to 66 in 1942, an increase of 21 per cent. Increased numbers of persons walking in areas of heavy traffic congestion was given as the principal reason for the increase in pedestrian fatalities.

Of the 222 persons killed in traffic, 150, or about 70 per cent, died in accidents that occurred in rural areas.

"The traffic toll constitutes a tragic blow at the war effort of this state," Farrell said, in urging drivers and pedestrians in Oregon to drive and walk more carefully in 1944. "Accidents strike at two important factors in the war economy of the nation, transportation and manpower. By avoiding accidents, we can speed the day of victory."

Portland Population Gains 20 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4—(AP)—The Portland metropolitan area has gained 20.1 per cent in population between April 1, 1940, and March 1, 1943, the census bureau reported today.

Multnomah county spurted upward 22.6 per cent from 355,099 to 435,490 and Clackamas showed a gain of 4.3 per cent from 17,130 to 18,014, giving the area a total of 495,104 compared to 412,299 in 1940.

The bureau grouped only the two counties in Oregon and said the figures were based on ration books 1 and 2.

Putnam Pleads Consideration Of Education

A plea for consideration of published statements concerning education came from State Superintendent of Education Rex Putnam as he spoke Tuesday noon before the Salem junior chamber of commerce.

Business men, he declared, do not read and believe, without any thought whatsoever, any person's remarks concerning business just because those remarks happen to be repeated in newspapers and magazines.

There is a definite attempt on the part of whole groups today to break the faith of the nation in its educational system. Schools no longer teach "readin', writin' and 'rithmetic," some folk claim and make their claims in print, he said, but they fail to point out that there is today a greater army of American technicians than can be supplied by any other nation in the world and that the credit largely should be placed upon the American school system.

To the criticism that schools today do not teach patriotism and civics, Putnam replied that in 1917 four per cent of the men called up by the draft attempted to evade the call; the 1942 selective service system found only three tenths of one per cent of its subjects evasive. This, he declared, should indicate an interest in the nation's welfare and an understanding of the individual's responsibility.

Snell Urges Paper Saving

Gov. Earl Snell urged Oregonians Tuesday to enlist in a continuing nationwide drive to conserve paper to avert a threatened slump in production of new paper products for military and elementary civilian needs.

"With normal sources not adequate to meet wartime requirements," Gov. Snell said, "an additional two million tons of waste paper are needed to keep mills at peak production, and more can be absorbed to build up reserve inventories. The need is real. Full cooperation is important."

Waste paper campaigns currently being carried on in numerous counties of the state will not be disturbed, the governor said, with timing of collection drives left to determination of each volunteer group. The urgent thing, he advised, is to save all waste paper from now on and to get in touch with local committees.

Handling is simplified, it is suggested, when newspapers are tied in flat bundles about 10 inches high, books and magazines in bundles about 18 inches high and flattened corrugated and cardboard boxes in bundles 12 inches high.

War Effect To Be Noted

Compilation of a complete record of World War II as he affected Oregon and its communities has been undertaken, at Gov. Earl Snell's request, by the committee on conservation of cultural resources of the Oregon state defense council, Chairman L. S. Cressman, committee chairman, announced Tuesday.

The purpose of the project is to preserve for future study all records that in any way show the effect of the war on Oregon, so that these may be available to future state and local officers.

The records eventually will be housed in the state library here. County civilian defense coordinators have been asked to assist in the project. "It is essential," Cressman said, "that all records showing the actual participation of Oregon people in the war be preserved."

Salem Postal Receipts Reach All-Time High

Postal receipts for 1943 totaled \$432,512.33 or an increase of \$32,853.11 over the previous year and marked an all time high for the Salem postoffice, according to Postmaster Henry Crawford.

The increase for the last quarter of 1943 was \$8435.39 over the last quarter of 1942 showing that it was fairly well distributed throughout the 12 month period.

Incoming parcel post sacks totaled 21,762 during the month of December while outgoing sacks of parcel post totaled 16,940, figures just compiled show. The greater number of incoming packages is accounted for by the early November mailing especially of overseas mail, the postmaster explained. The extra amount received was itself mailed in November but did not reach the Salem office until December, it is explained.

Auto Owners Selling Cars Warned by OPA

Automobile owners were reminded Monday by the district OPA office of the new plan which went into effect January 1 providing more effective control of gasoline rations issued to car owners selling their cars.

The plan, intended to effect savings in gasoline that otherwise might be used unlawfully, will work as follows:

When selling his car, the owner must take his remaining gasoline coupons to his war price and rationing board which will issue him a receipt in duplicate. Both copies of the receipt and the tire inspection record must be given the new owner who will give the original copy to the motor vehicle registrar when applying for new registration certificate. The duplicate, together with the tire inspection record, he must present to his board when applying for new gasoline ration.

From January 1, 1944, no board can issue gasoline coupons for a vehicle that has changed ownership after close of business December 31, 1943, unless the applicant submits the duplicate receipt.

Col. Hays Warns Of Bad Checks

Merchants of Salem and vicinity should require that proper identification be made before cashing checks of men in uniform warns Col. Samuel D. Hays, commanding officer of Camp Adair in a letter to the Salem Merchants association. Col. Hays' warning was provoked by various reports that service men, or supposed service men, have been imposing bad checks upon merchants within a radius of Camp Adair.

Col. Hays stresses that every bona fide enlisted man carries an identification tag and every officer an identification card which in themselves are uncontestable proof of their bearers' authenticity. Therefore, says Col. Hays, it is to the benefit of every merchant to ask for such identification.
