Dallas Council Hears Of Project Survey Just Completed

DALLAS — The city council met in regular session Monday night, Mayor F. E. Kersey, presiding.

During the business meeting C. B. Sundberg of the finance committee reported that a piece of property at the corner of Main and Maple streets had been sold to Adolph Schneider. The bridge at the south end of Main street is being repaired.

C. B. Sundberg, chairman of the housing project, reported that contractors had staked out lots for the housing project and that E. J. Himes, county engineer, would make a survey and set the street grade stakes Tuesday. Sundberg reported that 24 houses will be built under the project and a number will be built by private contractors.

An audit of the records of the water commission made by Arthur O. Davidson of Salem was received and ordered filed.

Elmo Bennett was granted a permit to operate and maintain an auto wrecking business in the city of Dallas. J. T. King, policeman, was granted leave of absence for military service. Eugene Hayter was reappointed to the ambulance commission by Mayor Kersey. His term to expire in 1947.

Miss Helen E. Bulter was appointed by the mayor to fill the vacancy on the library board caused by the resignation of Mrs. Raleigh Middleton.

Turkey Growers Vacation, Await New Crop of Poults

SPRING VALLEY — "We had an unusual mortality rate in our turkey poults," said Mrs. W. E. Wineberg of Spring Valley, when questioned concerning the successful turkey project in which she and Mr. Wineberg engaged in 1943, raising 950 poults out of 1040.

The early spring was cold, with much rain, and young turkeys do not thrive well in damp weather. The biggest losses were when the poults were taken from the brooder houses and installed in open roosting sheds in the fields. When matured, 920 were sold on the market and 30 dressed out for customers. Taken all in all, we considered that the venture was a success.

"We had the bronze turkeys, a beautiful bird, we think. "Yes," said the little lady, "we intend to raise turkeys again this year; in fact, have ordered 2000 poults."

"Of course, our situation was ideal for the turkey business. We made the brooder houses and pens in a big field, with good drainage. The big birds had plenty of green feed and water."

Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Wineberg are taking a short vacation at the present time, or at least that is what they call it, as they do not have any turkeys to care for at present.

The first turkeys were sold in early November, the second lot at Thanksgiving, and the last of them went December 2.
