Scio Postal Receipts High

SCIO — Records of the Scio post office indicate considerable increase in business for the quarter ending December 21, 1943, according to E. Phillips, postmaster. Total of \$2016 in stamp sales is shown for the last three months of 1943, as against \$1780 for the same period of 1942.

Christmas business at the office totaled \$1000.77 for 1943, while 1942 figures show \$913.23.

Series E bond sales for December amounted to \$2925, the postmaster stated Saturday. Prorata sales of bonds are expected materially to increase, in the opinion of Mr. Phillips, during the fourth war bond campaign, which opens January 18 and continues through January 31.

Regular business at the office, exclusive of bond sales, for the last quarter of the year just closed established an all-time high, according to official records.
