Institutions Produce Food, \$502,000

Foodstuffs with a wholesale value of \$502,000 were produced in 1943 at Oregon state institutions.

The Oregon state hospital raised food products valued at \$141,000, Eastern Oregon state hospital \$69,000, state penitentiary \$101,000, Fairview Home \$69,500, state training school for boys \$15,000 and state industrial school for girls \$5000.

The board authorized a second payment for the 1943 flax crop purchased by the state flax industry. This payment is based on \$15 a ton for no. 1 flax, \$12 a ton for no. 2 flax and \$4 a ton for no. 3 flax.

Profits from the flax industry for the past year totaled more than \$100,000.

Mt. States Wage Raises

SEATTLE, Jan. 12—(AP)—Wage boosts averaging nearly 8 cents an hour were granted to Mountain States Power company employees in the Willamette division, the regional war labor board said today.

Union office workers in the Coos Bay division received a 4 cent increase, and non-union employees a 10 1/2 cent increase.

A second decision increased general helpers' wages at Smith Forge & Manufacturing company, Portland, to 93 cents. A \$3.63 wage was approved for plant superintendents, working foremen, and steam hammer operators.

Spencer Dehydrators, Inc., a newly organized Lebanon firm, was authorized to pay the following scale: foremen, 86 to 93 1/2 cents; foreladies, 70 to 78 1/2 cents; general male labor, 69 1/2 to 85 cents; general female labor, 57 1/2 to 69 1/2 cents.

Poliomyelitis Deaths Down

PORTLAND, Jan. 12—(AP)—Infantile paralysis isn't causing as many deaths as in former years, Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, state health officer, said today.

Despite an epidemic which surged to a total of 415 cases in Oregon last year, improved methods of treatment kept the mortality rate down to 5.2 deaths in every 100 cases, he said.

In 1941, however, the mortality rate was even lower—3.6 deaths in every 100 cases.

Pecan pie (or FILBERT)

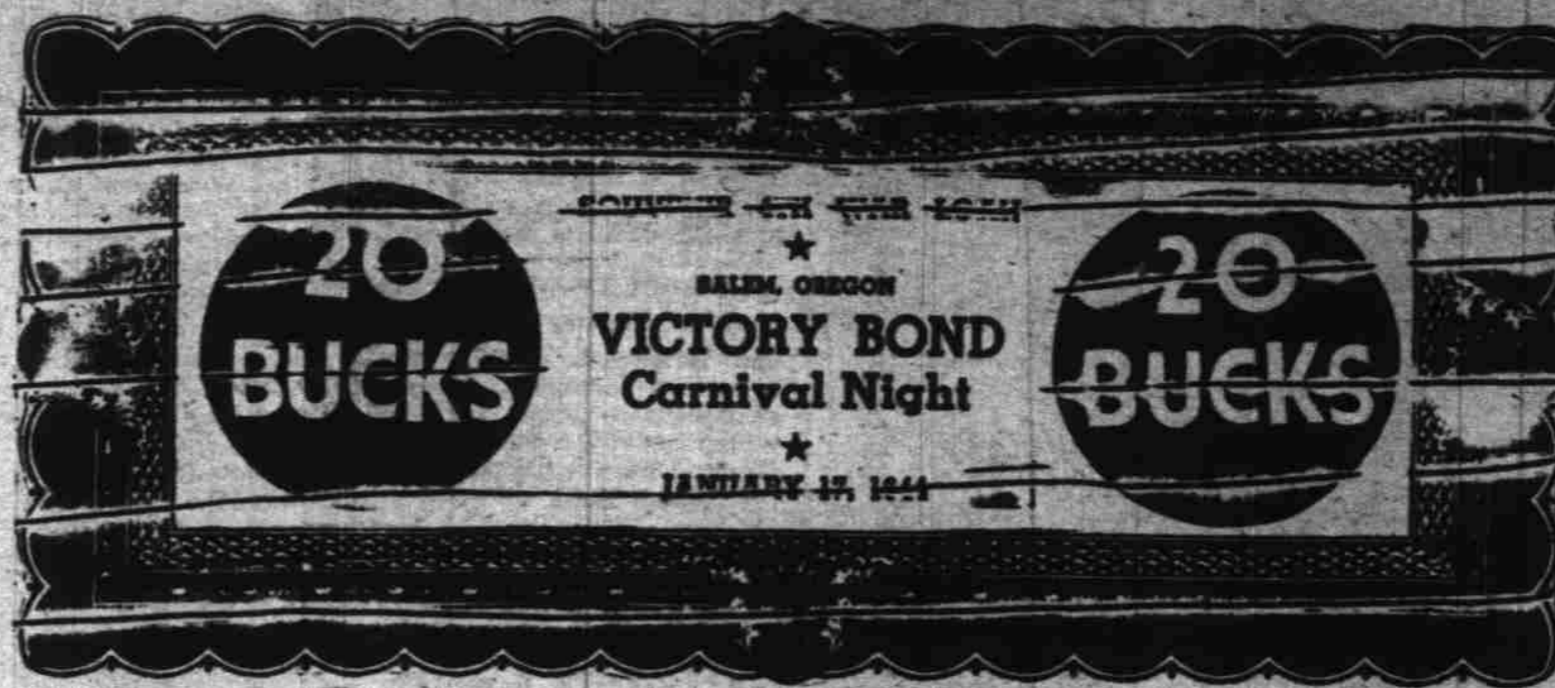
1/2 cup sugar, 3 tablespoons flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 cup dark corn syrup, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 3/4 cup pecans.

1 unbaked pie shell (about 8 inches in diameter).

Blend sugar with flour and salt. Add eggs, syrup, vanilla and pecans. Pour into the pie shell. Bake 10 minutes in moderate heat.

Lower heat to moderately slow—three hundred—and bake 40 minutes. Serve, cut in small pieces. For extra flavor in pecans, toast them by heating 10 minutes in a moderately slow oven.

Sanders Work On Ice-Frosted Oregon Roads

Sanding crews worked Wednesday to roughen an ice-frosted surface over highways leading out of Pendleton and The Dalles while a climbing mercury eased the cold spell over western Oregon.

Chains were required for cars attempting to cross the Wapinitia and Wolf Creek highways. Motorists described the Columbia River highway as a regular skating rink.

Snow at Pendleton froze as it hit the street. The Dalles was sheathed in ice and the weather bureau promised more of the same for today.

Willamette valley residents, however, loosened their coats as the mercury stuck above minimums of 34 at Salem, 26 at Eugene, and 32 at Portland.

The weather bureau forecast clouds and rain in western Oregon, hoisting storm warnings from Fort Angeles to Newport and small craft warnings from Newport to Cape Blanco.

Gas Consumption Off 15 per Cent

Gasoline consumption in Oregon for the first 11 months of 1943 aggregated 211,717,000 gallons, a decrease of 15 per cent from the consumption of 250,018,636 gallons for the same period of 1942.

Total tax paid on gasoline consumed in Oregon from January through November was \$10,585,850.71 as compared to \$12,500,932.50, a drop of \$1,915,081.79.

RATION CALENDAR

FOOD

Canned Goods—Green stamps D, E and F good through January 22 for processed fruits and vegetables, jam and jelly. G, H and J good through February 22.

Meat, cheese, canned fish and edible fats. Stamps R, S and T good from January 1 to January 2. Sugar—Stamp 29 in book 4 good for 3 pounds until January 15. Stamp 29 becomes valid January 15, expires March 31.

SHOES

Stamp No. 18, book one, good indefinitely. Airplane stamp No. 1 valid now.

GASOLINE

Book A coupons No. 9 good through January 11 for three gallons each. Value of gasoline coupons: A, B1, C1, 3 gallons; B2, C2, R and T, 5 gallons; D, L, 1 gallon; E, 1 gallon.

FUEL OIL

Parled 3 coupons expire February 4. Coupons with gallonage printed on the face valid for amount indicated until expiration date shown on coupon sheet.

TIRES

Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 2 months, for books every 4 months. A books every 6 months. Commercial motor vehicles—tires inspected every 1 month or every 500 miles.

STOVES

Purchaser must get certificate or ration book for new stove. WOOD SAWDUST, COAL
