DALLAS—T. V. Tibbutt of Hillsboro has been named assistant county agent for Polk county by the Oregon State college extension service, it has been announced. He will succeed Bryant Williams, who resigned to farm in Klamath county.

Mr. Tibbutt attended Oregon State college and majored in farm crops under the late G. R. Hyslop, and was employed for some time by Professor Hyslop in certification work. He was known in college sports as an outstanding wrestler.

Before entering college he lived on a dairy farm and has had considerable experience in the Willamette valley. He has most recently been employed as AAA assistant secretary for Washington county where he has made an outstanding record. Previous to working there he was district representative for the state department of agriculture in the southern Oregon district for three seasons.

Marion County's Nutrition Needs Discussed, Plans Made

The Marion county nutrition committee for defense met at the home demonstration agent's office in the old high school building Monday to consider plans for the new year. Miss Frances Clinton, chairman, presided with Mrs. Preston Doughton, secretary, Neal Craig of the vocational educational department, reported

on the Salem community cannery, that 125,000 cans were processed during the first year of operation and that plans are being made now for the coming season. With equipment already set up operation is expected to begin sooner this year.

Mrs. Olive D. Bynon of the Marion county Red Cross chapter reported that nutrition classes plan to be offered in the near future; also stressed the need for suggestions being published on diets for blood building for donors to the blood bank which comes to Salem every Tuesday.

Miss Clinton announced that with pressure cookers no longer rationed, the sub-committee for considering applications would be automatically dissolved.

Miss Delphine Savage, a representative of the Marion county civilian defense council, offered full cooperation of the council in the nutrition program.

Mrs. Preston Doughton was appointed newspaper publicity chairman. Nutrition talks are to be given on the radio. Election of officers was held with Miss Clinton re-elected chairman and Mrs. Doughton re-elected secretary.

Others present were W. G. Nibler, county agricultural agent; Amos W. Bierly, county 4H club agent; and Mrs. C. A. Lynds of the county FFA council.
