Legionnaires Sponsor
Younger Boys Group
for Polk County

DALLAS — A meeting of all parents of 9, 10 and 11-year-old boys is scheduled for Wednesday night in the library club rooms for the purpose of organizing a Cub pack for these boys too young, as yet to become scouts.

The new Cub pack will be sponsored by the Dallas American Legion post which sponsors the successful Scout Troop No. 24, now under the direction of J. J. Paden. Elmo Bennett of the Legion, has been delegated to aid in the organization.

Don Lundberg, the Cascade council assistant scout executive, formerly the scoutmaster of troop No. 24, was present Monday afternoon to meet with all of the prospective Cubs and to describe to them briefly, the program and the need of parent participation in Wednesday night's meeting in order that the boy might become a cub.

Dallas is following the policy of successful Cub packs throughout the council, in requiring the parents, both mother and dad if possible, attend this organization meeting with their son in order for him to be eligible to join. This policy results from the fact that cubbing is a backyard, home-centered, afternoon program, which of necessity requires a high type of understanding and cooperation on the part of the parents in order that it succeed.

Dallas, at present, has two successful scout troops and the addition of a cub pack will bring the influence of scouting to at least 50 boys in this younger age bracket.

Both Mr. Lundberg and Mr. Leighton of the Council office will be present to explain the program and aid in getting the organization under way. It is hoped that no parent will disappoint their son by their failure to attend this meeting with him. The time is 7:30 p.m.

Farmer Use Burlap Bags To Be Challenged

Farmers in the states of Oregon, Idaho and Washington using burlap bags for their wheat and small grains will be allowed to purchase 100 per cent of the bags they bought in the base period of 1940, it was announced by Taylor Greene, district war production board director.

In an amendment to conservation order M-221, WPB provides that the west coast wheat bag may be used for packaging small grains in the western states, but only for packaging small grains, and changes the base for bag purchases, in order to meet increased demands on the part of the farmers not using bulk storage.
