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Valley Bond Rallies Start

Polk County Quota Set
At \$682,500; Plan
Careful Canvass

DALLAS — The fourth war loan drive started Tuesday with the quota for Polk county set at \$682,500. This figure is slightly over \$34 per capita for each man, woman and child in the county. Subscriptions expected of individuals is set at \$403,600; and business corporations \$278,900. The E bond quotas for individuals has been set at \$359,800; F and G bonds at \$41,000 and other series bonds at \$2,700.

A house-to-house canvass will be made in Dallas through the block leader system, Mrs. H. D. Peterson, chairman and the drive will end February 1, according to E. J. Page, county chairman of the war finance committee.

MT. ANGEL BOOSTS QUOTA

MT. ANGEL — Mt. Angel's aim for the fourth war bond drive is the purchase of an ambulance plane and for this purpose the quota for this district has been voluntarily raised from \$100,000 to \$110,000.

The altruism that is to bring mercy and help instead of bombs to the fighting men is to be called the "Spirit of Mt. Angel" and is another evidence of the town's readiness to stand behind its service men. The name was chosen by the committee of solicitors who will canvass the district.

J. H. Fournier, chairman of the district, in his message to the people, asked that special courtesy be shown the men who have taken on the task of soliciting this huge amount of money. He stated that the sale of the series E bond is to be stressed.

Representing Monitor was Edgar Tweed, chairman of that town. Meeting with chairmen and the solicitors were Jesse Gard and Arthur Smith of Salem, county leaders. Gard announced that the county's quota was \$5,000,000 and that of Mt. Angel \$100,000. By common consent, the men agreed to raise that quota by ten thousand dollars to cover the cost of an ambulance plane.

The bond sale started Monday and it is hoped that the necessary amount will be sold in the first weeks so that the drive can be completed in the quickest possible time.

Besides the series E there will be five other types of bonds available. Insurance companies and banks will also be allowed to participate.

Workers Receive E Awards, Then Back to "Do It Again"

SILVERTON — Scarcely five minutes after the last note of the Star Spangled Banner, played by the Camp Adair band, the final number of the Army and Navy "E" award program at the Silver Falls Timber company sawmill, faded away, the entire crew of workers were back at their jobs, carrying on the production for which the award was made.

This efficiency was complimented by Col. Fred G. Sherrill, executive officer, procurement division, military supply officer, of chief of engineers, in presenting the production award.

"There is," said Col. Sherrill, "hardly an activity on any front that is not touched by lumber. The ammunition—the bombs—the guns—the planes—the tanks are packed in it. So are the food and the clothing. Thus does lumber govern the magnitude of our military operations which, in turn, determine the duration of the war."

Col. Sherrill paid special tribute to Myron Woodard, president of the lumber company: "This company under Mr. Woodard's guidance was already doing what Ben Alexander, vice president, later made it possible for the entire Douglas fir industry to do whenever the war demanded; namely, make the lumber produced available for war to the exclusion of everything else."

Charles A. Sprague, publisher of The Statesman and former governor of Oregon, master of ceremonies, mentioned that the local community along with the company had right to feel proud of its record, as there were only three other lumber mills in Oregon which had achieved such records.

Col. Sherrill presented the production award banner which was raised by Camp Adair color guard. W. L. McGinnis, director and general supervisor of Silver Falls Timber company, accepted the production award. Lt. Comdr. H. N. Anderson, Portland, presented the "E" pins to representatives of the company, including E. J. Boesch, president of the Sawmill and Lumber Workers local, AFL, 2725, who has been with the company since April, 1922; Charles Bayes, secretary of the union; M. C. Steward, longest employee of the company, coming here in December, 1912; H. W. Preston and W. L. McGinnis of the management.

Following the presentation, all mill employees, who had previously been presented their pins, were asked to pin them on their clothing in unison. George M. Christenson, past president of Silverton local 2725, Lumber and Sawmill Workers, AFL, accepted the pins for the employees.

Sprague read a telegram from M. C. Woodard, complimenting his employees upon their production record, and H. W. Preston as business manager, and W. L. McGinnis, as superintendent. Over 1500 attended the presentation program which was held at 1 o'clock in one of the dry sheds at the mill. At the request of J. W. Jordan, Silverton chamber of commerce president, flags were flown on Silverton streets and business houses for the occasion.

Parachutes Purchased

Auburn School Sets Aim
At Four; Has First
And \$9.25 to Go

AUBURN — The school is taking part in the fourth war loan drive. One \$45 parachute for each classroom was set for a goal, with all money over the cost of four to be applied toward more parachutes. The first report of sales shows four parachutes purchased and \$9.25 toward another.

Allen Olson is general school chairman. His poster committee is Shirley Utting, Carolyn Lee, Glenna Dodson, Duane Anderson, Robert Feakens, Lambert Feakens, Gary Hutchinson and David Thieson.

Each room has its own chairman: first and second grade, Wilda Cable; third and fourth, Sharon Lavery; fifth and sixth, Gerald Covey; seventh and eighth, Walter Hart.

Posters have been made for the four rooms and one in the main hall. Two types of posters were used, one a huge key to victory on which was placed a thermometer registering from zero to \$45. Each time a room buys enough stamps and bonds to raise the mercury to \$65 a small parachute is fastened to the poster.

The other poster was a blue barograph mounted on white. The bar represents \$65, starting with zero at the top, a small white parachute makes the descent to a safe landing on \$65 at the bottom.

Each time the parachute makes a safe landing a colored parachute is fastened on the mounting of the poster.
