

Warehouse Nears Finish

Scio Mill Building To Be Occupied in Immediate Future

SCIO — The addition to the Scio mill building will soon be enclosed and ready for occupancy as a warehouse. The new structure is 40x40 feet of lumber construction, to be covered with galvanized iron, as are other buildings of the company.

Salvaged clothing recently assembled and classified at Scio is to be sent to its destination as soon as practicable. Chairman N. I. Morrison of the local committee has been ill at home for a week but plans to continue the work as soon as he is able. Several women of the community classified and packaged the garments.

Mrs. Bess Philippi of Scio is among those of this community whose names have been drawn for circuit court jury service at Albany.

Anton Benes, veteran of world war one and a farmer and dairyman near Scio since that time, is reported to be ill this week. He and his family have been spending winters in Arizona for his health for several years, but were prevented this year by gas and rubber restrictions.

Mr. and Mrs. Jake Taylor, who have been at Oceanlake for some time returned home Sunday.

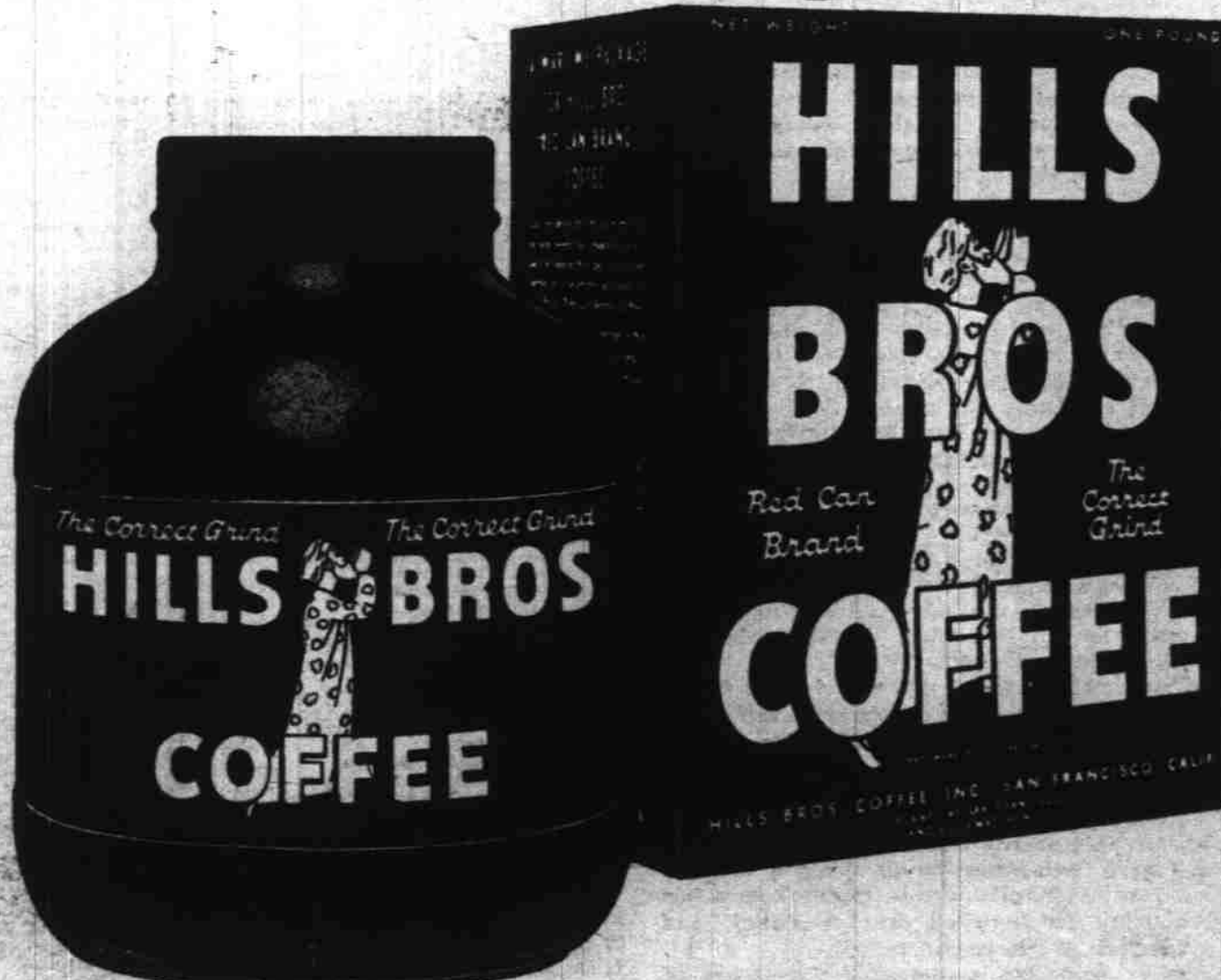
