Folkies Brief Filed—Defendant's brief in the case involving Robert E. Lee, Folkes, Negro, under death sentence for the slaying of Mrs. Martha Virginia James on a Southern Pacific passenger train in Linn county January 23, 1943, was filed in the state supreme court Wednesday. Folkes was convicted of first degree murder in the Linn county circuit court last May and has since been in the state penitentiary here. The appeal to the supreme court was based on the refusal of the lower court judge to give certain instructions to the jury and permitting the state to introduce transcribed stenographer's notes relating to admissions by the defendant.

To Be Re-sentenced—Mandate in the case of Harvey Cunningham, negro, under death sentence for the slaying of Richard W. Kerr in Portland on August 29, 1942, was sent out Wednesday by Arthur S. Benson, clerk of the state supreme court. Cunningham was convicted of first degree murder in Multnomah county and his conviction later was affirmed by the supreme court. He is now in the Multnomah county jail. Officials said Cunningham would now be resentenced in compliance with the mandate.

Car Registration Drops in 1943

Motor vehicle registration in Oregon for 1943 totaled 415,269 vehicles, a drop of only 2 per cent from the registration of 424,777 vehicles in 1942, Secretary of State Bob Farrell said Wednesday.

Trucks and buses both showed increases while passenger vehicles decreased. There were 1138 buses registered, an increase of 15 per cent. Trucks jumped from 42,907 to 43,919.

There were 332,552 private passenger vehicles in the state last year, compared to 341,367 in 1942. Registration fees in 1943 totalled \$3,377,081.97 compared to \$3,352,722.68.

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
