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LETTER TO A MARINE

Dear Bill:
It was just by chance that we heard that you were one of the men who stormed the beach at Tarawa. It must have been tough to paddle straight into those Jap machine gun nests in your rubber boat. It took lots of guts to keep on going when you couldn't so much as fire an answering shot and your buddies were falling on every side of you.

Well, you won the battle, and don't think for a moment that the people of America will ever forget it. Right now we're doing what we can to speed the day when we can bring you home again. We've got a couple of battles of our own, on hand, not the kind that takes any particular bravery and pretty soft compared to the battles that you've had to fight, but battles that need winning just the same. Our shipyards are holding up their end in the Battle of Production, turning out the ships that carry your guns to you.

And all of us are just starting to fight the Battle of the 4th War Loan. There's nothing very courageous about stepping up to a counter and buying war bonds, we know that, of course. All the same it's got to be done if we are to keep those supplies rolling to you. And for the next month, at least, we'll have to do some real scrimping because the E bond quota alone is more than a hundred dollars for every man and woman who works for a living.

That isn't hay, Bill, but here in Oregon we'll do it. You wouldn't think much of us if we ever let you down and you can be sure that we won't.
