Highway Group Says Truck Overloads Must Be Removed

When commercial and logging trucks are found to be overloaded hereafter they will not be permitted to proceed until the overload is removed, the state highway commission announced in a statement Friday heralding a change of policy in enforcement of load limits. Enforcement will be in the hands of the state police.

The announcement followed a conference held Tuesday at the capitol, attended by state highway commissioners, state police officials, the public utilities commissioner and representatives of OPA and ODT.

The highway commission said that 85 per cent of the truck operators are cooperating to preserve the highways, with the minor percentage apparently persistent and chronic violators. These latter operators overload their trucks consistently, officials declared.

"Our experience is that the nominal fines imposed by justices of the peace upon violators is no deterrent to the unlawful practice, since the profit from the overload more than pays the fine, and costs," highway commission members said.

The commission indicated that it was not fair to suspend the permit of an entire fleet of logging trucks when only one truck driver had violated the overloading regulation. Question also was raised by the commission whether it has authority to permit overloaded trucks to continue over highways and bridges after weighmasters have determined the overload.

Records of all future violations will be sent to the office of price administration which is concerned over the effect of excessive speeds and weights upon tires and gasoline. As a result of this decision by the highway commission, violators will be subject to the additional penalty of having rationing boards refuse tires.

"The highway commission feels that the statute weight of 54,000 pounds, plus the tolerance of 7000 pounds, giving 61,000 total gross load, is the maximum that the highway bridges and pavements will stand and that operators should be able to load so as not

Supreme Court Refuses Boilermakers

Following a hearing Friday, the state supreme court refused to accept jurisdiction in a mandamus proceeding which seeks to stay all proceedings under four recent orders of Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson of Multnomah county, relating to local 72, Portland, of the International Boilermakers' union.

Arguments of attorneys, which consumed more than two hours, centered chiefly on two orders issued by Judge Dobson. One of these vacated an injunction against the governing committee of local 72 of the union while the other provided for the appointment of a receiver for the local. Under the latter order Oscar Furuset, Portland attorney, was appointed receiver with authority to take over control of the local from Otto W. Mursener, international vice president.

Wilber Henderson, representing the international, argued that the appointment of a receiver was not a cure all for the disension prevailing in the union, and urged that the court issue a final order on his original complaint.

Opposing attorneys, including Charles Robinson, charged that the orders of Judge Dobson were not final and consequently were not appealable.

This contention was denied by Henderson who said Judge Dobson's orders were final despite the fact that he apparently had attempted to circumvent appeal by issuing four orders when one order would have sufficed.

Robinson said it was evident that appointment of a receiver for the local was successful in that the receiver had accomplished more in three days than Mursener accomplished in a year. Furuset, as receiver, has called an election of delegates of local 72, to attend the international union convention which opens in Kansas City next week.

Latourette Foresees FDR Only Candidate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21—(AP)—President Roosevelt probably will be the only presidential candidate on the democratic primary ballot in Oregon, Howard Latourette, democratic national committeeman from Oregon, predicted today.

He added, however, that he could not make a forecast on Oregon's balloting in the fall. The influx of shipyard workers adds an unknown quantity to the Oregon vote, he said.
