NEW YORK, Jan. 22—(AP)—The stock market today was a shade higher on balance after a week devoted almost entirely to buying of rails and specialties.

While advances were limited to small fractions generally in the short Saturday session, there were a few liquor gains of a point or so. Plus marks were well distributed at the close but numerous issues were a shade lower or without any variation at all.

At the start wheat displayed a little strength, traders expressing disappointment that offerings of the cash grain in the past few days were not as large as expected.

At the close wheat was unchanged to 3/4 lower, May \$1.70 3/4, oats were 1/4-1/2 lower, May 78 1/4, rye was down 3/4-3/8, May \$1.29 1/4-3/4, and barley was 1/2 higher, September \$1.19.
