CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 24.—(P) The Washington Huskies fought off a closing Oregon State rally tonight to trim the Beavers, 38-33, and run their string of northern division, Pacific Coast conference, hoop victories to five.

Coach Hec Edmundson's traveling team of civilians had a comfortable 24-16 lead at the half. The Beavers came back to make a battle of it, closing the gap to 33-28 five minutes before the end as Guard Jack Simms sank three marathon heaves of the howitzer type.

The Huskies stalled, and the over-anxious Beavers, bent on getting possession of the ball, let Codd and Al Mar slip through to score clinching baskets. Allen Anderson aided Simms in the final period scoring, but it wasn't enough.

Anderson, the Beaver freshman guard from Corvallis high, was high scorer with 14 points. Codd paced Washington with 10. Big Jack Nichols, Husky center, was held to a single field goal for the night but netted six free tosses for an eight total.

It was these free tosses, made by Washington and missed by Oregon State, which also reflected largely on the outcome. The Huskies made good 16 gift tosses from 17 Oregon State fouls while the Orangemen hit only seven resulting from 13 Washington fouls. In field goals scored the Beavers had 13 to Washington's 11.

It was loss No. 4 for the Beavers for the season, and in order to stay alive in the northern division derby they must conquer the Huskies in the second game of the series here tomorrow night.

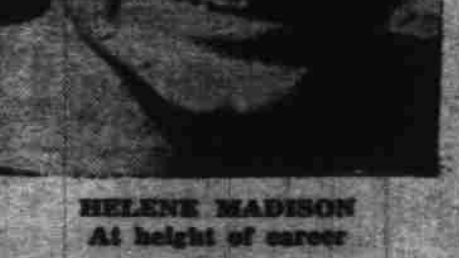
Former Matchless Mermaid 'Queen Helene' Now 'Perfectly Happy' as Wife and Mother

SEATTLE, Jan. 24.—(P) What ever "became of "Queen Helene?"

Helene Madison, world's swimming sensation back in the years between 1923 and 1932—only woman ever to hold all 16 women's world championship swimming records at one and the same time—is "perfectly happy" today in her career of wife and mother.

And she's tried several careers since that day when she climaxed her swimming fame in the 1932 Olympic games at Los Angeles.

MONTREAL, Jan. 24.—(P) At least six national hockey league records were shattered last night when the Detroit Red Wings defeated the New York Rangers, 15-0, at Detroit. The league office today listed them as follows:

The score, 15-0, was the most one-sided in league history. It was the biggest shutout score. Detroit's 37 scoring points on 15 goals and 22 assists were the highest total any team has achieved in one game.

The eight goals the Red Wings scored in the third period formed the biggest single-period scoring outburst. They also were the greatest number of consecutive goals in one period. The 22 scoring points in the third period established another one-team record total.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—(P) Organized baseball, which has been sending many of its best men into the armed services for the last three years, is due to receive a slight return on its investment this season.

A few athletes—very few in comparison to the number who have joined up since the end of the 1943 season—have been discharged from the army and navy and will return to their old trade of playing ball.

The Chicago White Sox will take no fewer than three ex-army men to camp. They have Myril Hoag, veteran outfielder, Roy Schalk, infielder in the Southern association in 1942, and rookie Pitcher Tony Annoreno.

Big Ed Levy, who was given a trial as the Yankees' first baseman last spring, traded to the Phillies and finally wound up in Newark, will come up again with the Yanks. The baseball draft skipped over him last fall because he was due for induction but the coast guard turned him back after a short time.

Jack Kramer, who pitched for St. Louis in 1941, is back on the Browns' roster. He was discharged from the navy.

The Phillies have signed Pitcher Albert "Stumpy" Verdelle, who won 36 games and lost only six for the Fort Dix, N.J. army team in the past two years.

Other major league possibilities among the more prominent minor leaguers includes Wayne Osborne, veteran Portland, Ore., slinger.

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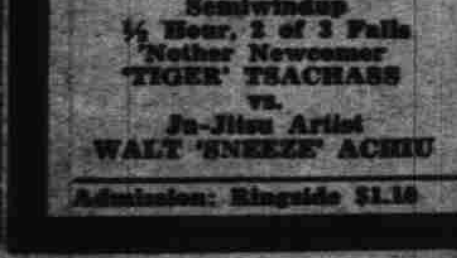
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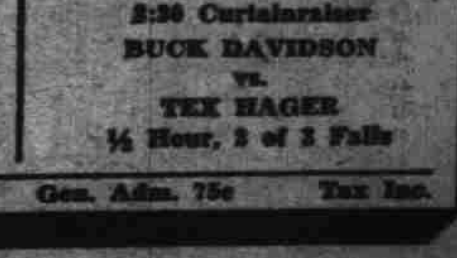
