Edwin D. Turner Rites To Be Held Thursday At Brownsville

ALBANY — Lee George, 80 died at the home of his son January 23, following a brief illness. Funeral services were held Wednesday. Rev. Alan Banks, pastor of the Assembly of God church of which Mr. George was a member, was in charge. Burial was made in the Miller cemetery near Shelburn.

Lee George was born January 1, 1864, in Spartanburg, South Carolina. His early life was spent in the south and in 1890 he came to Oregon, and for the past 15 years had lived in Albany. He was a farmer by occupation but retired from the farm a number of years ago. On December 23, 1888, he married Elizabeth Trolinger in Spartanburg. She died in 1941.

Surviving are four daughters and two sons, Mrs. Nora Brown of Corvallis, Mrs. Carrie Ashbaugh and Mrs. May Nelson of Vancouver, Wash., Mrs. Iola Clarke and James George of Albany, and Walter George of Shelburn.
