Court Asked to Remit—The county court has received a communication from E. L. Peterson, director of the state department of agriculture, asking remittance to the department of Marion county's share of the county fair fund millage tax, amounting to \$2671.71. Of the sum, \$500 will go to the state fair, while another \$500 will be returned to Marion county to be distributed for expenses of the county 4H fair, the exhibit of the Future Farmers of America, the corn show at Central Howell and the lamb show at Turner.

Maj. Frank Salvages Adair Waste

By selling trimmings of vegetables and meat to a garbage collector, fats to the butcher, bottles and worn-out clothing to still other markets, he and his assistants managed to salvage and put

to some sort of use \$25,000 worth of what civilians might have termed "waste" at Camp Adair during the last three months of 1943. Maj. Tony Frank, quartermaster and salvage officer at the camp, told Salem Lions club Thursday noon.

There has been "waste" in the army for exactly the same reason there would be "waste" in the home of the average newlyweds if the groom weren't afraid of hurting the feelings of his

bride, Frank maintained. And back of the fact that inexperienced cooks have been called upon to prepare the food for the army's millions is the fact that while he was still chief of staff, Gen. Douglas MacArthur asked of congress, and was denied by it, the funds and the authority to develop a training nucleus which might have been ready to help with the swift expansion of the army, the speaker said.
